CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES.

We are glad to note in Sir Wilfrid Laurier's speech in reply to Sir Chas. Tupper a tone of self-reliance on the part of Canada in regard to our trade relations with the United States. There is no question that the repeal of the reciprocity treaty of 1854-65 was openly and sincerely regretted by the people of Canada. The treaty had really been a great benefit to both countries, and not less to our neighbors than to us, but inasmuch as it was terminated by them against the wishes of Canadians generally, the impression became fixed in the minds of the people of the Republic that Canada was at their mercy.

For some years both the government of Sir John Macdonald and that of Hon. Alexander Mackenzie betrayed an over-eagerness to secure a renewal of the main provisions of the old treaty. This was followed in Sir John's second term by the retaliatory policy which was brought in with the system of industrial protection in Canada. The Liberal leaders presently made the even greater mistake of formulating the policy of commercial union. Though they were in opposition at the time this proposition served to deepen in the American mind the conviction that a very large proportion of the Canadian people stood ready to go almost any length to secure reciprocal trade relations with the States.

The Liberal leaders, when once in power manfully corrected their past error by adopting and giving effect to a policy of preferential trade with the Mother Country. Upon that measure, parties in Canada and the country generally are fairly well united. It proved a revelation to our neighbors and has done much to remove from their minds the erroneous impression produced by the mistakes of the past. They now see Canada more prosperous than ever before, her trade expanding, her industries busy, her treasury full, without any aid from reciprocity treaties. What is more, they see a united, self-reliant Dominion, which has learned the lesson of industrial and commercial independence. We may obtain a measure of reciprocity as the result of the Joint Conference when it resumes its sittings, or we may not. In the meantime we feel and have made our neighbors feel that we can get along very well without it.

The British government will appoint a successor to Lord Herschell on the High Commission. This clearly indicates that the work of the Commission is not ended, nor is the attempt to arrive at a settlement to be abandoned. Some newspaper writers had apparently formed the impression that the adjournment of the Commission to August next was final, and that there would be no further meetings of that body.

There is great progress going on in sections of South America as well as in North America. Argentina, for instance has doubled its population in about 25 years, has now a million foreigners among its population and is developing the production of grain and cattle with enormous strides. Paraguay has the climate of Italy, which it equals in size, but with a population of only 300,000 to Italy's thirty millions. This region is now attracting immigration. Uruguay, another pastoral region, has settled 100,000 immigrants within the past 18 years. Over a million immigrants have entered Brazil since 1871. Chile, Columbia and Venezuela are also making considerable progress.

Paris La Patrie affirms that Colonel Hay, the United States ambassador to London, spent more than fifteen millions of dollars on the English press to Americanise it, and create a sentiment in the British Isles favorable to the United States and unfavorable to Spain. "It was not the newspapers which were paid," says La Patrie. "British newspapers, it must be admitted, rarely take money." But they were supplied daily with a cable service of five or six thousand words, poured in upon them without increased cost over their ordinary outlay for telegrams. "That explains the steady and systematic hostility toward Spain, of all the false news which has enabled the Americans to deceive the world. Without the employment of such means the United States would never have succeeded in crushing Spain in the face of a Europe instinctively hostile to their expansion." So says La Patrie. Our readers can take the story for what it is worth.
