THE INCOME TAX. full value of his improvements while his shiftless, thriftless neighbor, on the same quantity of equally valuable land, with tumble down buildings, rotten fences and scrub stock is taxed on the worthlessness of his belongings, whereas he should in reality be taxed specially for wasting the land he is living on. The Income Tax was certainly intended for the tradesman as well as the salaried man, otherwise it would be a much greater iniquity than it is. Why should the man who earns the sweat of his brow or by that of some other fellow's brow, be liable to the tax. The fellow who receives a stated weekly, monthly or yearly salary can be easily got at. If his weekly earnings, multiplied by 52 amount to \$1200 he pays a tax on \$700 or goes to jail. If the cobbler cobbles shoes to the amount of \$1200, over the cost of the material used and the rent paid for his shop, he pays a tax on \$700, if you can catch him, but you can't, for in nine cases out of ten the cobbler doesn't know how much he earned during the year. He only knows that he has been able to support his family and pay his bills on what he made and that there is a good deal less than \$700 left over. The man who earns a salary of \$1200 also knows that what is left after deducting his living expenses is much less than \$700, but he has to pay his tax simply because the taxers know how much he made. What is true of the cobbler is true of the merchant, the lawyer, the manufacturer and every other tradesman or professional who earns all he can. He, too, deducts his living expenses—including a trip to Europe—and pays a tax on what is left, less the amount exempt for the class he is in. The income tax is as wrong in principle as the tax on farm values. The man who improves his farm, erects fine buildings, builds good fences and raises valuable stock is taxed to the

time of the Crimean war, in 1854, became an independent kingdom in 1879. In that year also Serbia which had enjoyed autonomy since 1830 shook off the Turkish Yoke and became a Kingdom. The next stage was the season of Bulgarian atrocities following the revolt in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Then followed the invasion of Turkey by the Russians. Through this invasion and the troubles which followed the larger part of Bulgaria succeeded in securing an autonomous form of Government dating from 1879. During the Young Turks revolution in 1908 Bulgaria declared her independence. Bosnia and Herzegovina which were now under Austrian protection were seized by Austria in 1908. In 1829 France invaded Algiers and after eighteen years conquered it. Later France took Tunis and she is now gobbling Morocco, while Italy is trying the same game in Tripoli, the result of which will probably be known in a few days as the war is practically over. Great Britain occupied Egypt in 1882 and now practically owns that country. In addition to this she is in possession of all the coast of Arabia outside the Red Sea. She also owns Cyprus, Crete is semi-independent, and is only withheld by the Powers from joining Greece. The remaining portions of European Turkey are now clamoring for liberty. Albania is looking for autonomy. Bulgaria claims part of what is left of Turkey; Bulgaria, Serbia and Greece all lay claim to Macedonia; Austria also has some claim on Macedonia. The political parties in Turkey are fighting each other while the whole Balkan peninsula is on fire and the European powers are afraid or unwilling to interfere lest the division that would follow a settlement of the numerous disputes might involve further and larger disputes. On one thing only are the Powers agreed, namely to prevent war if possible as a fire started in such a tinder box might mean a general conflagration which would involve them all. The probability is that there is going to be a fight. How it will end, or where or when no man can predict.

THE INCOME TAX. Sir:—Would you kindly enlighten me a little on the Income tax act, on the following cases, let A man having a salary of (\$1200) Twelve hundred dollars, pays tax on \$700 Seven hundred—five hundred exempt for living expenses. 2nd s run as a tradesman, a small business making, by sticking to my job morning noon and night a fair good living coming out at the years end sometimes twenty-two dollars in the good—sometimes that amount in the hole. Am I, under the Act, really liable for income tax? Is there really nothing allowed for me to live on that is not taxable? Was it really the intention of the Government to tax the laboring man? A reliable man told me recently, that he was so hard strapped he had to borrow money with which to pay income tax, but still according to his conception he did not see how he could escape tax. Do you consider he has a true conception of the act? Was the Act intended to include the cobbler, saddler, carpenter, and such like as well as what we are disposed to call the moneyed man? HORIZON OF THE NATIONS IS MORE THREATENING THAN FOR A LONG TIME. LADYBANK, Fifeshire, Scotland, Oct. 6.—Premier Asquith declared today that he had not lost all hope that the unspeakable calamity of war might be averted by the powers working together in careful and loyal co-operation for the preservation of peace. In addressing his constituents he said he could not say more at the present moment than that every thing that could be done was being done to prevent such an immeasurable catastrophe. He admitted that for a long time the international horizon had not worn such a threatening aspect as it did to-day. WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 6.—No trace has yet been discovered of the missing Lammman, Sask., merchant, Rose, who was the cause of the death of W. McLeod of Halifax, ten days ago. The searchers have nearly all been called in and as Rose had a good start he may have found a hiding place with friends in Winnipeg. The police are now endeavoring to locate him there.

WHEREABOUTS OF ROSE STILL UNKNOWN. CANADA'S GRAIN EXPORTS TO ENGLAND. OTTAWA, Oct. 6.—W. J. Egan, Canadian trade commissioner at Manchester, in a report to the department of trade and commerce on importations of grain into the United Kingdom, gives some interesting statistics. In 1920-11 the United States sent 13,825,000 hundredweight of wheat or 17,000,000 bushels to the United Kingdom, whereas Canada sent 13,825,000 hundredweight, or 25,000,000 bushels; in 1911-12 the United States increased their sales of wheat to 16,619,000 hundredweight, or 32,000,000 bushels, Canadian sales going up to 19,810,000 hundredweight or 37,000,000 bushels. In 1910-11 the United States sold 5,300,000 hundredweight of flour to the United Kingdom as against 2,970,000 hundredweight sold by Canada; in 1911-12 the quantities were 4,418,000 and 3,900,000 hundredweight respectively. BROKE ARM AND LEG. AMHERST, Oct. 6.—Yesterday several boys, belonging to the town, were driving in from Truemanville with a load of wood, one of their number, Joseph Baxter, aged about fourteen, attempted to climb on the wagon, when the horse started throwing him on the ground, the wheel passing over him breaking his arm above the elbow and his leg about the knee. His companions notified the nearest neighbors and a team was sent to carry him there and a physician from Amherst, in response to a telephone message, motored out and set the broken limbs and brought him to the home of his parents, Joseph and Mrs. Baxter, Havelock street, where he is resting comfortably. The young lad, after the accident, and during the painful setting of the bones, displayed the nerve that constitute a hero. Naturally, his young companions feel very badly, but it was purely accidental. DIED UPON HEARING OF BROTHER'S CRIME. LONDON, Oct. 6.—A special to the Times from St. Petersburg, states that Myasniunski, a well-known millionaire, and a member of the Upper House of the Russian Parliament, died suddenly in St. Petersburg, on learning that his brother had disappeared with \$350,000 of his firm's money. PRISONERS KILL GUARD. VANCOUVER, Oct. 7.—In New Westminster prison on Saturday, Huard Joyousen was killed while preventing the escape of H. Wilson and Joseph Smith. They were in for long terms for burglary. By force and strategy they overpowered several guards till Joyousen came along and fired at them. One picked up the guard's rifle and shot Joyousen. Wilson was shot and wounded and both were then overpowered.
