USE GOOD SEED GRAIN

Charlottetown Experimental Farm News Letter.

Spring is perhaps quite a busy yet, but farmers would do well to consider their requirements of seed grain for the coming crops. The majority, of course, will either use their own seed or exchange with their neighbours. This practice is quite satisfactory if proper attention is given to cleaning and treating the grain before seeding. Some means of sifting out all weed seeds should be used. If wild rye seed is present this will be practically impossible and in such cases a change of seed is advisable. If the previous crops have been infected with smut some treatment must be used to control the disease. Loose and covered smut of oats, covered smut of barley and bunt of striking smut of wheat may be effectively controlled by formalin treatment. Loose smut of barley and loose smut of wheat can be controlled only by hot water treatment. Growers who have trouble with these latter diseases would do well to obtain new seed, as the hot water treatment is very difficult to use.

Those who wish to buy new seed should purchase the best on the market. The extra cost per acre will be more than returned in increased yields.

Registered seed is the only dependable grade. Those using such seed are assured that the variety is pure as to type, practically free from disease, of good germination and free from noxious weed seeds.

LIVERPOOL, N.S., March 7-(G.P.)-Two occupants of a coal truck who said they did not hear the whistle, narrowly escaped injury at a siding here today when their car was struck by a Canadian National train bound from Yarmouth to Halifax.
