THE SALVATION ARMY.—A Prediction exchange says that meetings of the Salvation Army Citadel Sunday were well attended and of unusual interest. Brigadier and Mrs. Taylor from St. John were in charge all day. The Brigadier, who has the oversight of the Army's work in New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Bermuda, stated that notwithstanding the conditions due to the war, Bermuda being under martial law, the Army work is making good progress. Quite a number of Salvationists from the Maritime Provinces were with the first contingent, and

others are with the recruits now enlisting. Over a thousand men, many of them reservists, went to the front from the Army's social institutions in England. Many of the Army halls and institutions in the countries affected are being used as hospitals and shelters for the homeless. Brigadiers Taylor also referred to the old linen campaign in the U. S. A. organized by Commander Eva Booth, schools, churches, clubs, hotels, etc., are co-operating and already tens of thousands of packages of bandages, gauze, etc., have been put up, after being sterilized, etc., under the direction of medical men. These are being forwarded with all dispatch to the warring armies.

ST JOHN AMBULANCE SOCIETY.—At a meeting held in the Armouries yesterday morning of the Nominating Committee appointed to elect officers for the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Charlottetown branch of the St. John Ambulance Society, the following officers were elected—President, Mrs. J. A. Mathieson; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. S. R. Jenkins and Miss Graham; Secretary, Miss Louise Lyons; Treasurer, Miss Vere Hyndman. A general committee was also appointed, consisting of two ladies from each church. It was decided to hold two classes in first aid work in each week, on Mondays at 7.30 p.m. at the Armouries, and on Tuesdays at 3 p.m. at the P.E. Island Hospital. It is absolutely necessary that those attending classes should be there on time. An entrance fee of 25 cents is payable to the treasurer, Miss Hyndman, at the Red Cross sewing on Friday night at the Armouries.
