WILLIAM D. MORRISON, who lived at Millburn, Lot 8, till he was quite a youth, is now in Boston in the employ of the Boston Elevated Railway Company. He has just been promoted from a brakeman to a guard, after having served in that capacity since December 31, 1901.

THE Rev. Leo Williams will deliver the eleventh address upon the Making of Manhood, course, next Sunday afternoon in Association Hall. The subject will be "The Highest Motive Power." The Rev. Mr. Williams has won the esteem and respect of very many young men of our City and many will hear him with pleasure Sunday afternoon. The Young Men's Orchestra of St. Paul's Church have kindly consented to take charge of the music and service of song.

THE death occurred at Wheatly River Tuesday morning from consumption of Alexander MacKenzie aged 68, leaving to mourn a widow (nee Mrs. Mobbs), one son James in Boston and one daughter Mrs. Mobbs, of Hunter River. The funeral will take place tomorrow to the Methodist Cemetery in Bungay.

THE death of Margaret, relict of the late Angus McQueen at Orwell, on Friday evening, 10th April, marks the earthly termination of a well rounded life. She was in her eighty-eight year. For two years and a half she was confined to her bed by illness and infirmity which was borne with exemplary patience. Remarkable for her loving and unselfish disposition and simple inobtrusive piety she will be greatly missed in the home which her life adorned, in the neighbourhood where she endeared herself to all and in the congregation of which she was a consistent and faithful member. She leaves a family of six, four sons and two daughters. These are: Alexander, of Calgary N. W. T., Albert Daniel, Mowbray, Man. Donald, St. John N. B. Angus, on the homestead, Mrs. Neil McNeil, Wood Islands and Mrs. Fraser, Westport, California. Their bereavement is tempered by the sympathy of their large circle of friends as well as by the fact that they "sorrow not as those which have no hope."

A neat volume of 300 pages issued by the Legislature of Massachusetts contains the report of the Joint Committee on Corporation Laws, the distinguishing feature of which is the appendix, a valuable document prepared by Frederick J. McLeod of the Boston Bar and son of Hector C. McLeod of Royalty, P. E. Island. Of this part of the work the New York Commercial and Financial Chronicle says: "This is a comparative digest of the corporation laws of all the States and Territories. In form a clerical labor and appearing at first sight to be merely a digest or index, it proves upon close inspection to be a condensed treatise on the comparative facilities which the various states offer to those taking cut corporation charters under their law. In clearness and suggestiveness of classification and in fulness of reference it is unsurpassed as a compendium of the laws of the United States upon this important subject." 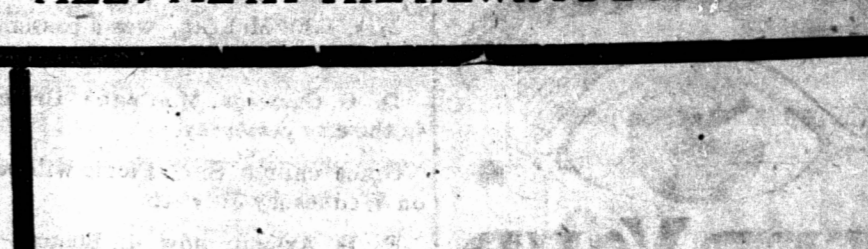
