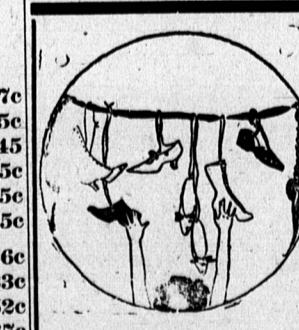

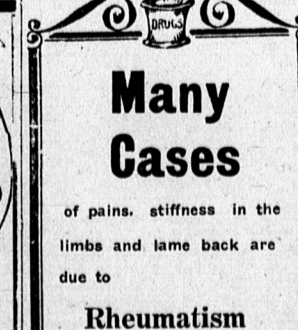

He will shortly tell the House of Commons that he has formed a committee "of all parties, classes and creeds" to assist him in his special mission being Africa. He plans to send a commission to East Africa to help solve the problems there.

NEW YORK, June 22.—While shopping crowds in upper Eighth Avenue looked on in amazement a young woman seized a man by the back of the neck as he emerged from a tenement house at the corner of 11th street and turned him over to a policeman.

## German Nobles Re- Assert Old Right Of Leadership

BRESLAU, Germany, June 22.—A large part of the German people demand leadership by men who are not looking out for themselves, but who place the common weal above their personal welfare, is the import of a resolution adopted by a gathering of German noblemen held recently in Berlin. And in the next sentence the nobility modestly tells the world who can qualify as leaders: "Such leaders have been the German nobility, and they intend to continue to be such."  
Every year representatives of the old noble families of Germany foregather in some city for a "nobles' day." They are convened by an elected marshal of nobility, who occupies a position something like that of grandmaster of a lodge, in the days of the Emperor. "nobles' day" was a very brilliant affair. It is now arranged on a much more modest scale, for many of the noble families have been reduced to virtual pauperism.  
That these circles are monarchist to the core goes without saying. Generally speaking the change in their personal status brought about by the revolution has not tended to make them more democratic. On the contrary, their official organ, the "nobles' journal," preaches more than ever, the nobility must stick together and demonstrate that their boasted blue blood puts them in a class by themselves.

## Kansas Without a Flag Completes Federal Group

WASHINGTON, June 21.—With 40 state standards in its possession, presented by organizations and individuals, and prospects of receiving soon those of the remaining states, the Post Office department boasts the most complete collection of official state flags Ohio, Utah, Montana and Kentucky recently were presented and accepted ceremoniously by Postmaster General New.  
The only state not now represented in the collection are Arizona, Kansas, Mississippi, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, Washington and Wyoming. Inquiries concerning presentation of a flag have been received from all but Nevada and New Mexico. Hawaii and Porto Rico flags are included in the 40 now preserved by the department, but there is none from the District of Columbia, which has no official flag; Alaska, Guam, Samoa or the Virgin Islands.  
Presentation of the flag of Nebraska recently by the Railway Mail Service association of Lincoln only after the difficulty of ascertaining the design. Appeals to the secretary of state and adjutant general of the state brought responses that that state had no flag and senators and congressmen from the state knew of none. It was finally determined the state's official seal on a field of gold had been recognized as the Nebraska state flag. It is under standing Kansas has no law prescribing a state flag, and as soon as one is adopted a flag for the Post Office department's collection is promised.
