ARMS-RUNNING REVEALED IN DRUG PROBE

Indictment Of Persons Of "Great Prominence" Predicted In Swindle Case.

(By JOHN FERREIS) (Associated Press Staff Writer) (NEW YORK, Dec. 19—AP)—The indictment of persons of "great prominence" today shortly after an executive of the McKesson and Robbins drug firm testified its President, F. Donald Oster-Phillip Musica, had contemplated a gigantic international deal in rifles and ammunition. The prediction was made by Brian McMahon, Assistant United States Attorney General, who came here from Washington to coordinate the investigations of Federal agencies into the mystery of the multiple activities of Oster-Musica and the firm's missing \$18,000,000 of assets.

This case has more "widespread ramifications than any other fraud case in my memory," McMahon said after a conference with various Federal officials.

Drafted Arms Contract
 The testimony linking Oster-Musica to gun-running plans was offered by Frederic Wingersky of Boston, a McKesson and Robbins vice president in charge of law and labor relations. Oster-Musica, he said, ordered him to draft a contract for the purchase of 100,000 Lee-Enfield rifles and 100,000 rounds of cartridges.

The purchase, however, was not made as far as he knew, Wingersky said. Wingersky testified at a hearing in the office of John J. Bennett, Jr., State Attorney, Ambrose V. McCall, Assistant State Attorney General, told Wingersky to report to Gregory P. Noonan, Acting U. S. Attorney, since that phase of the investigation of the \$87,000,000 firm lay outside the state's jurisdiction.

At the same time, Joseph F. Ruggieri, Assistant State Attorney General, who went to Canada last week to locate the five warehouses where the McKesson and Robbins crude drug supplies supposedly were stored, reported the firm rented a warehouse in Montreal for five years. The warehouse had been erected in 1916 for the United States Government for storage of ammunition and war implements.

McKesson and Robbins, Ruggieri said, paid the owner, J. Bierman, identified as a reputable citizen, \$12,000 a year. The lease expired in 1936 and Ruggieri said he understood the building had not been occupied since that time.

The contract to buy arms, Wingersky testified, was drawn last May. "Will" McMahon and other Federal officials were conferring in the federal building, Oster-Musica, who killed himself last Friday in his villa at Fairfield, Conn., after he was revealed as the "brains" of a swindle 25 years ago, was buried from a Brooklyn funeral home.
