THE RAIN CAME AND FIRES ARE OUT
LIVERPOOL, August 16.—The rains that came down in torrents today, beginning at three o'clock this morning, have effectually, it is hoped, headed off the forest fires on this coast. There is danger however, that the fires are not completely extinguished. The depth of the turf and the way the fire had permeated this gives cause to the fear that in case of continued wind the flames may be fanned into renewed existence.
The fire-fighters will continue their work to make sure, if possible, that embers remaining and hidden fire in the turf, may not again become a source of danger.

ILLUMINATED EELS.
Some time ago the Danish Government began, under the direction of its biological station at Copenhagen, an interesting effort to aid the fishermen of the Baltic by preventing the migration of eels from that sea into the ocean. The means employed is a "barrier of light," formed by placing 50 electric lamps along a submerged cable between the island of Fano and the coast of Fuzen. The effectiveness of such a barrier depends upon the fact that the eels migrate only during the dark hours. Accordingly, as soon as darkness begins in the season of migration, the lamps are illuminated, and thus a wall of light is interposed from which the eels recoil. A similar principle is said to have been employed from time immemorial by fishermen on certain parts of the coast of Italy.—From the Scientific American.

BALTIMORE LIKES CARDINAL GIBBONS
"Cardinal Gibbons is the most popular man in Baltimore, bar none," said a New York reporter who served a term of six years in the Monumental City. "He is also the most democratic man, and maybe that's the reason for his popularity. He is not only revered for his learning and his wisdom, but liked personally by every one, Jew and Gentile, Roman Catholic and Protestant. And the athletic—they put him next to Santa Claus in their affections. The cardinal is as fond of the children as they are of him."
"One of the stories told about the cardinal and his liking for little ones is that he once forgot the cares of the church and hammered a golf ball for two hours just because the twelve-year-old son of one of his friends wanted a playmate."
"Another story is told by a distinguished matron, one of Cardinal Gibbons' greatest helpers in his work. The cardinal called to see her about some charity affair in which they were interested. While she was putting the finishing touches to her toilet at her children's undertaking to entertain the cardinal, and when she entered the reception room one of her small sons was on his knees with the cardinal's famous silk hat pulled down over his ears, while the other was vainly trying to get the little red skull cap, which is a sacred part of the apparel of the cardinal. The cardinal was enjoying the fun as much as were the children."
"Some of the cardinal's best friends are newspaper men. All of them have the greatest respect and liking for him. He is always open and frank with them. He has been interviewed thousands of times, and I don't think he has ever been misquoted or his confidence betrayed."
"He was wont to receive the reporters on Saturday afternoon, when they desired to get his sermon for the next day. He would bring out his sermon, written in a composition book, and let them go to work. In about fifteen or twenty minutes he would bring out cigars, one for each reporter present. They were long and thick and fragrant. I don't know whether he ever smoked—I never saw him smoke—but I do know that, judging from those cigars, he was a good judge of tobacco."
"The cardinal is a familiar figure in the streets of Baltimore, or was when I was there. He enjoyed walking, and walked much even in his rooms in his residence, just back of the cathedral. The house is a fine old residence, but plainly, even severely, furnished. The floor of his bedroom is plainly carpeted. Two or three chairs are set primly against the wall. There is an old-fashioned washstand, an old oak bureau with a small mirror, a marble topped table and an ancient four poster bedstead."
"In his study he has a roltop desk, while the walls are hidden by bookcases with glass doors, reaching from floor to ceiling, full of books, all showing more or less wear. In the parlors are red covered tables, more
