pleasantly. Sixty degrees in all were

In the graduating class in Arts were two

and Daniel McNeill Crawford, Wood
Islands.

Among those who received the degree
of Master of Arts was M. J. McPherson
of Orwell.

On the evening of Tuesday a large At
Home was given in the college by the
members of the Halifax Alumni and the
graduating classes. Music was furnished
by the band and an orchestra. The
evening was pleasantly spent in dancing
and general conversation. The large
number present thoroughly enjoyed
themselves.

The closing exercises of Pine Hill
College, Halifax, were held in St. Mel-
tew's church on the evening of Wednes-
day April 29th. Addresses were delivered
by Rev. Principal Pollok and by Rev.
Prof. McComb who has been filling the
chair in apologetics made vacant by the
appointment of Rev. Dr. Gordon to the
principalship of Queen's University,
Kingston.

The addresses which were directed in
particular to the members of the gradu-
ating class were able, and were listened
to with close attention by the large
audience present.

The graduating class is one of the
smallest in the history of the college,
there being only five in all. Three out of
these five belong to P. E. Island. Their
names are as follows:

M. J. McPherson, M. A., Orwell; E. H.
Ramsay, B. A., Hamilton; Eben Mc-
Donald, B. A., Valleyfield.

Mr. McPherson intends locating at
present in Escuminac, N. B.; Mr. Ramsay
in Metapedia, N. B.; while Mr. McDonald
expects to settle on the Island.

Out of the several prizes given by the
college Mr. Ramsay won two, viz: The
Senator McKeen prize given to the best
public speaker of the third year and the
Robt. J. Grant memorial prize given for
the best essay on the subject of "Infant
Baptism." Wm. McDonald, B. A., who
has been appointed to labor in Bloomfield
won the Wainwright prize given to the best
reader in the second year and R. B. Lay-
ton, son of Rev. Jacob Layton, formerly
of Marshfield won the prize given to the
person making the highest marks in a
written examination on elocution in the
first year.
