Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Fee, by order may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader, in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 90 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

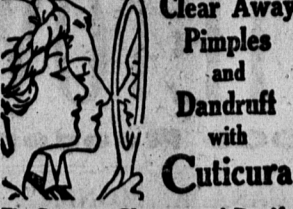

The following letter has been received by Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Summers, Kensington, P. E. I. It will be remembered the Private Summers referred to was killed on the 9th of August.

B. E. F. France, Oct. 18-18 Dear Mrs. and Mr. Somers,— It is with the deepest regret that I learn of the death of your son John and I take this opportunity of extending to you my deepest sympathy in this your hour of bitter bereavement. MISS MARY J. NICHOLSON

On Monday the 18th November the people of Kilmuir and vicinity were greatly shocked and grieved to learn of the almost sudden and altogether unexpected death in Hanna, Alta, on Nov. 14th of Miss Mary J. Nicholson youngest daughter of the late John and Annie Nicholson of Montague and a sister of Daniel J. Nicholson of this place.

The deceased young lady had been engaged in teaching school in the western town referred to and during the influenza epidemic while rendering aid among the sick stricken inhabitants she fell a victim of that dreadful scourge against which she so faithfully endeavored to administer relief. The late Miss Nicholson was 32 years of age and for over 12 years had been engaged in teaching school in this province. She had a first class license from Prince of Wales College and taught in various sections of the province where her undivided attention to duty and natural qualification for her chosen profession she created a record which was seldom successfully rivalled and rarely if ever surpassed. At the close of last school term she decided to try her fortune in Western Canada and about 1st of September took up her duties as teacher in Hanna, Alta, High School where although only during a brief two months period of service she was apparently duplicating the reputation she had gained in her Native Province. She leaves to mourn her untimely death one brother, Daniel J. Nicholson of Kilmuir and one sister, Mrs. John McKinnon of Strathcona, P. E. Island; also a large circle of relatives throughout the province and elsewhere and a host of sympathetic friends in various parts of the country where her duties as a teacher required her lot to be cast. Her remains were temporarily buried in the West owing to the unfortunate condition of the telegraph wires which prevented any instructions being forwarded as to what arrangements were required regarding burial. ter received by her brother, since the telegraphic news of her death arrived it appears that Miss Nicholson, after the schools had been closed offered her services in a hospital where such was urgently required and immediately accepted and while thus engaged an appeal for assistance came from a private home where all members of the family were suffering from the disease. She was asked if she would go and although warned of the danger of responding to such a request she felt the call of duty so strongly that she willingly became a sacrifice if need be. Two days after taking charge of this case she was stricken again following a brief illness her spirit passed away to Him who gave it. "Greater love hath no man than that (that a man lay down his life for his friends)" but Miss Nicholson not only fulfilled but surpassed this Christian ideal, she gave her life for strangers. Truly it may be said of her she laid down her life in this temporal world that she might take it up again in the great eternity. She died as she had lived in sacrifice and service. She saved others, herself, she could not save. (Patriot please copy.)
