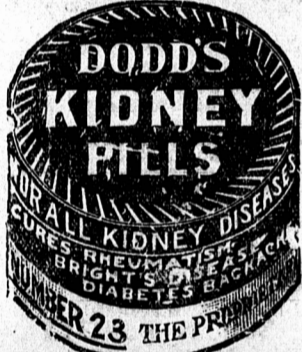

THE WEATHER

THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON ETC

(Special to the Guardian.)

TORONTO, July 25.—Fresh southerly westerly winds, warm showers at first then clearing. **THE WEATHER.**—Yesterday was cloudy with a light shower in the morning; rain at night.

The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexall Store tested thermometer with a northern exposure was 62 degrees above zero and with a southern Ras 64 above.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 72 degrees above zero and the lowest was 65 above. The lowest the previous night was 62 above, at nine p. m. 65 above. The tide will be high this afternoon at 3.19 and tomorrow at 4.11; it will be high tomorrow morning at 3.36 and Sunday at 4.05.

The sun sets this evening at 7.38 and tomorrow at 7.37; it rises tomorrow morning at 4.35 and Sunday at 4.36.

The moon rises tonight at 10.35. The moon was full Friday, July 18 at 2.06 a. m.

The last quarter of the moon will be on Saturday, July 26th, at 5.59 a. m.

The length of to-day will be fifteen hours and four minutes.

DECISION MAY HAVE FAR-REACHED EFFECTS.

ROME, July 23.—The pope has set his seal on a much debated case of exceptional interest in ecclesiastical law. Father Gaetano Arena, an Italian secular priest, who had been exercising the functions of priest-hood for twelve years, recently desired to be freed from all sacerdotal obligations on the plea that he was morally constrained by his parents while under age to enter the sacred ministry.

The pope pronounces the ordinance of Arena null, and will restore him to all the rights of a secular member of the church, including that of contracting a religious marriage. It is believed that discussion will have a far-reaching effect in the ranks of the Catholic clergy.

EGYPT GETTING MEASURE RESPONSIBLE SELF GOVERNMENT.

CAIRO, July 23.—It is officially announced that the Egyptian legislative council and the general assembly are to be combined in one body which will be called the executive assembly. It will consist of the Ministers and sixty-six elected and seven-nominated members. The latter will comprise of president, vice-president, four Copts, three Arab Bedouins, two merchants, two doctors, one engineer, two educational members, and one municipal representative.

BRITISH FOREIGN OFFICE HAD NOT HEARD.

LONDON, July 23.—The British Foreign Office has not heard of any British Council in Mexico requesting the services of a battleship, according to Francis Dyke Acland, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, in reply to a question in the House of Commons today. He said the Foreign Office had cabled to inquire into the rumor.

FIRE IN PERTH.

PERTH, July 24.—The Home of Walter Brooks and the Baptist Church adjoining were destroyed by fire early this morning. The loss is from \$5,000 to \$6,000.

POSTHUMOUS WORKS OF COUNT TOLSTOI DESTROYED

ST. PETERSBURG, July 22.—Emperor Nicholas has approved of the decision of the Holy Synod to destroy the three posthumous works of Count Leo Tolstoi, on the ground that they are unorthodox comments on the Old Testament. The protest of Count Tolstoi's relations against such action has proved unavailing.

THE NORTHUMBERLAND.—The S. S. Northumberland arrived in Charlottetown last evening at 8.05 o'clock.

AQUATIC SPORTS.—Entries for the Aquatic Club's Sports on Monday evening will close with the Secretary today at noon. The events will be Speed Boat race, Race for all comers, for which boats classed as speed and semi speed are not eligible. Canoe race, Rowing race for shells, and Stick-at-it race. As the Motor Boat races are handicapped, chances are even.

SUMMER SCHOOL.—The members of the International Geological Congress reached Halifax early on Sunday morning. As they could stay for only one day there they were treated to an excursion on the harbor in the afternoon. The officials of the summer school were invited to accompany them. The weather was ideal and a very enjoyable time was spent. An interesting and instructive lecture was delivered before the school on Monday evening by H. I. Smith of the Anthropological Department of Geological Survey, Ottawa. His subject was Archaeological Research in Canada. The subject sounds dry but the lecture was not. Tuesday evening's lecture was The Place of Physical Training in the School Curriculum. The lecturer was Major Outhit, director of the physical training course for teachers of the Dominion. He defined physical training as applied to physiology. He claimed and established his claim, that the effect of the training was not merely physical but mental and moral as well. All that heard him, and that was a large audience, were fully convinced that there was not more deserving of a place than was that of physical training.

MARITIME FIELD SPORTS.—The annual track and field amateur championship sports of the Maritime Provinces will be held in Charlottetown on the Abegweit Amateur Athletic Association's grounds on Thursday August, 21st next. An interesting program of sixteen events has been arranged. There will be three bicycle races, over distances of half a mile, a mile and three miles; six flat races, of the following distances: hundred yards, 220 yds., quarter mile, half-mile, mile and five mile; while the remaining events will be the following athletic competitions: 120 yds. hurdles, (the hurdles to be three and a half feet high), high and broad jumps, pole vault (for height), throwing the hammer, 16lb. in weight (for distance), putting the shot 16 lb. (in weight). There will also be a hundred yards dash for boys. To the winner of each event, a gold medal emblematic of the championship of the Maritime Provinces will be given; while the second man will get a silver medal and the third man a bronze medal. The sports are opened to all registered athletes, and will be conducted under the rules of the Maritime Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, the executive committee of which is composed of Dr. H. D. Johnson (President) and Mr. L. B. McMillan (Secretary) of Charlottetown, Col-Sgt. W. O. White, Messrs. L. A. Gastonguay, A. W. Covey, A. M. McArthur, J. Holmes, J. McG. Stewart, C. G. Kent, F. A. Phenev, B. Haley, L. A. Simpson, D. A. Cameron and Leonard McNeill. Entries for these sports are to be made with Mr. McMillan, and will close on the 15th August next.

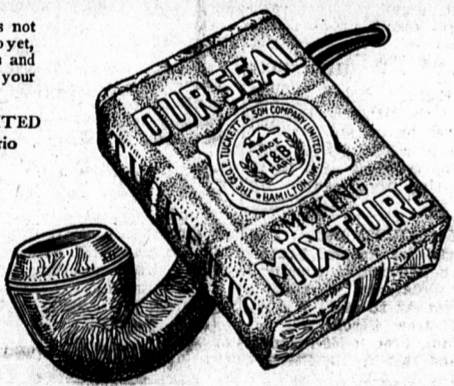
