Chinese Smuggling Easy.

That the smuggling of Chinese across the United States border is not a sporadic, desultory sort of game, indulged in by a few men willing to gain an illicit livelihood by taking long chances, but a tremendous, organized business, in which many thousands of dollars are made each year is the statement of George Latour, of Windsor, the so-called "King of the smugglers," who a few days ago pleaded guilty, to a charge of violating the Chinese exclusion act, and was sentenced to three years in the Detroit House of Correction.

A Windsor Chinaman, in some tour of the county, said recently, "is at the head of the Chinese smuggling trade in this part of the country. The proprietors of many Chinese laundries in Windsor are engaged in the trade, which is organized on a broad scale. This is the plan: When the leader thinks the time is ripe he notifies his associates in Vancouver, and they ship on Chinamen to him at Windsor in lots of ten or twelve. When they arrive in Windsor, he either hides them in his own place, or arranges for their seclusion in some other joints, and there they will wait until a good chance presents for getting them over the river. Taking them across is one of the simplest things in the world. All one needs is nerve and a quick wit. I was in the business for two years, and I never found any great trouble in eluding the officials. Latour says the price paid for taking a Celestial across the river ranges from \$75 to \$250, but it is never below the former figure.

Help Badly Wanted.

A new record in applications for Ontario farm help what more than a thousand requests for farm hands are being sent in during the one day to the Ontario British Immigration Office of the Dominion Government at the Toronto Union Station. The Government has perfected an organization of a hundred agents in the province and also placing an agent in every town in Ontario. The object of this organization is to learn the needs of the farmers, place the new arrivals with them when they come, and, most important of all, keep in touch with the newcomer until he is placed with a farmer. Should he for some reason not get along well with the farmer with whom he is placed the immigrant is not to be allowed to drift into the cities as has been the case in other years, but instead will be placed with another farmer.

Fatalities Among Alpinists.

In view of the fact that every man or woman who walks up a mountain with alpenstock in hand is a climber in the eyes of the public, it is not at all strange that the appalling annual fatalities in the Swiss Alps are laid at the door of one of the noblest of sports. The truth is that these fatalities—there were 105 last year—are relatively few and far between in the ranks of genuine alpinists, the amateur and professional mountaineers. They who climb with ice ax instead of alpenstock are cautious—first, last and always. Considering the risk taken, few of them lose their lives. Most who meet this frightful death in the Swiss mountains have always been either reckless thinking or downright reckless disregard of common sense. These unfortunate go where they have no business to go and in charge of an experienced guide, and sometimes the mere reaching out for a coveted wild flower sends them to their doom.—Spur.

London's First Bank.

Banking, seeing that it flourished in the ancient world—in Greece, at Rome and at Babylon—must, so far as England is concerned, be regarded as a comparatively modern business. During the so-called renaissance banking reappeared in Italy. From Italy the business of banking spread to France, then to Holland, and it was introduced into England by one Francis Child, who established the first bank in London in 1663. Hitherto London merchants had deposited their cash in the mint of the tower of London. But when Charles II, took it into his head to borrow traders began to lodge their superfluous cash with the goldsmiths in Lombard street. Francis Child was one of these, and in a few years Lombard street became full of banks. The Bank of England was founded in 1694.—London Globe.

Love Song of a Bird.

"Just before an April dawn," says W. P. Pycraft in "The Courtship of Animals," "the cock caperealtze proclaims its love lover from a tree in a strange, unmusical serenade. "With outstretched neck, drooping wings and spreading tail he gives forth a weird, uncouth kind of song, more or less divisible into three parts, each out of a series of notes which He begins with a series of notes which remind one of nothing so much as the sound made by two sticks knocked together at intervals of ten to fifteen seconds, getting quicker and quicker and changing in key till at last they become bell-like. Strathcona's Romantic Marriage.

The marriage of Lord Strathcona was a romance. He met the lady when he was twenty-nine, and living on the coast of Labrador. She was a widow, and had a little son. There was no priest or church within 1,000 miles, and the marriage was a simple contract without ceremony. It was for this reason that when the High Commissioner became a peer in 1877 a re-marriage was held to be necessary, and it was solemnized with the full ritual of the Church of England.

An innovation was introduced into university election contests at the Trinity College Literary Society annual elections in Toronto recently, when in the last five minutes of polling a number of men were discovered in the shower baths who had not exercised their franchise. These were not permitted to even put on their slippers. One student shouted as they were being carried to the polling booth that it would be a clean vote.

Father Hubbard.

The nursery knows nothing of Father Hubbard, but in 1904 Thomas Middleton published "Father Hubbard's Tale of the Ant and the Nightingale." In the introduction he explains: "Why I call these Father Hubbard's tales is not to have them called in again as the Tale of Mother Hubbard. The world would show little judgment in that. Flour For China.

All the flour mills in the West continue to make extensive shipments of flour to Hong Kong and other Oriental points. This indicates the favor in which western Canadian flour is held in these countries. The Medicine Hat mills are shipping considerable quantities to San Francisco and other United States coast points through having the advantage of a short rail haul over the large milling centres of the United States.

Wireless Baffled By Sun.

In wireless signalling at Newcastle, N.B., it has been found that stations that can reach a ship 1,000 or 2,000 miles at night cannot reach 200 or 300 feet in the daytime. This is supposed to be caused by the electrification of the ether by the sun's rays, which presumably makes it more difficult for the artificially created waves to travel through the ether.
