A National Problem

Historical.

From now until Tuesday next—Declaration Day—the field is open to those who choose to guess, predict or prophesy as to who shall secure the reins of Government after Premier King and Lord Byng decide the question. With those who know the inside workings of the two parties there is apparently some difference of opinion.

King and his followers will naturally believe that Mr. King should be called in and asked to choose a Cabinet and then with the assistance of the Progressive members carry on business at the old stand. On the other hand the Conservative reitort would be that Mr. King has not the largest group of members at his back, therefore he must give way, as this was the precedent established in 1921 when he was summoned to form a Cabinet because he had the largest group.

We think it is safe to say that the same precedent will be followed on the present occasion. Some may claim that the Liberals and Progressives constitute the largest group. This is set aside, however, by the reminder that Premier King declared during the late campaign that he stood a majority of his party over Conservatives, Progressives, Independents and Laborites. It will be quite interesting to note how this attitude and the present situation can be reconciled. It is probable the majority of the prophets will contend that it cannot be done.

Turning from this little imbroglio to what may or may not happen should the Liberals be permitted to hold on to a slim chance, the question is what position would they occupy on the floor of the House when it meets. The Conservatives form a very formidable group and with matters as they are it would soon become as hot as midsummer, or the equator. That the Liberal policy has been rejected at the polls and should be discarded would be the Conservative rallying cry, and it is one that cannot be got over. It would be no use for the Liberals to appeal to the country again as their policy has been condemned, and it would be impossible and contrary to precedent to form a new policy on the floor of the House.

Looked at from all these angles it strikes us very forcibly that His Excellency will decide to call on Mr. Meighen to assume the task of selecting his Cabinet, and if he can obtain a majority on Declaration Day proceed to count his supporters. Should he fail to gain the support of a clear majority over all those who will still be a deadlock, nothing would remain to be done other than a Dissolution and another General Election. Thus the country will be face to face with an unprecedented situation.

As regards Mr. Meighen's prospects of winning out, it would seem that his are superior to those of his opponents. His policy has been practically speaking already endorsed at the polls, and the election would be merely a matter of form to settle the deadlock and install a stable Government at the Capital by the winning side.

As stated, the Liberal policy has been rejected at the polls already. In the event of a General Election taking place it would lie with the people to give an emphatic answer. That there was something wrong with the policy of the Liberals—something which did not meet with the approval of the electors—is self-evident. Given another opportunity to be heard it would be a good time to say what is the matter and stamp it out. If Labor is oppressed it is just the time to fight the wrong. If there are any deep-seated wrongs to be redressed, let it be done NOW. Let the cry go up:—

"Where is that slave so slowly, Who, could he burst, His chains at first, Would pine beneath them slowly."

Let us all hope that whatever turn matters take will be for the good of Canada. A return to the old, solid two-party system, would, we think, be the best solution of the problem.
