REVENUE, EXPENDITURE AND DEBT.

It was one of Benjamin Franklin's maxims for the individual that "gain may be temporary and uncertain, but expense never fails." The saying is equally true as applied to governments, municipal, provincial, or national. If in a bad year the revenue falls off, the expense continues and overbalances the receipts; or some emergency arises and must be met; public buildings are burned or bridges are swept away and these must be replaced; the very progress of the world calls for new outlays; the growth of commerce calls for the improvement of ports and navigable channels and the building of rail ways. To meet such emergencies or new demands money is borrowed and thereafter an interest charge is added to the annual outlay. A debt once incurred continues to grow like a rolling snowball, for nations, states or municipalities, unlike the individual, rarely pay their debts.

And yet it is better for the state as for the individual to pay as it goes. The people themselves believe this and yet are themselves largely to blame for the ever-increasing outlay and new borrowings. They must have new roads, wharves, bridges branch railways, new public buildings. One section makes a demand because, another has been supplied and thus one supply ever creates a new want. By and by the cry of extravagance, of debt and deficit, is raised and it may be a new party is called to power by a spasm of economy among the people. The new men take charge under promise of retrenchment. We may assume that they are honest in their pledges. But they, like their predecessors are met with pressing demands. At first they resist, but in the end they, too yield to pressure, and after a few years they plunge along the line of least resistance and are found expending the public moneys with more lavish hand than their predecessors, whom they had condemned for extravagance.

So it falls out that this rich Dominion of ours, so richly dowered with natural resources of soil, forest, mine and sea, which began business forty years ago with a gross debt of ninety millions has increased it to four times that amount, and has already paid in interest charges three hundred and sixty millions of dollars. In the meantime the Provinces have been doing the same thing, and the cities and municipalities, and the railway and other large corporations. By all these agencies an enormous debt and interest charge has been added upon us and upon posterity and today we are borrowing and spending with a more lavish hand than ever before. Federal taxation in Canada in forty years has mounted from less than twelve millions a year to nearly seventy millions a year; the cost of living has enormously increased, till Canada is fast becoming one of the dearest countries to live in. And yet any man who would venture to call a halt would be in danger of being denounced as an obstructive or a pessimist. Old men say, "it will last out my time," and younger men want to see things moving and money in circulation. In the meantime governmental extravagance reacts upon the individual. Habits of economy and

thrift are no longer so much the rule among our people as they once were. They are looked upon as old-fashioned and outworn. Honest toil and frugality have lost something of their old-time repute. There are ten looking for a government job where there was one forty years ago, and he is always dissatisfied with his pay when one gets the coveted place. On every hand is the call for shorter hours of work, more pay and more time for recreation. Our legislators at Ottawa have set the pace at four times the pay they received forty years ago, and the multitude would like to follow, but there is not money enough to go round. It is idle to remonstrate. Let us borrow and spend and make merry, and let posterity settle the bills!

INDEPENDENCE OF PARLIAMENT.

Hitherto the independence of Parliament has been carefully guarded. The bill now before the Legislature to amend and consolidate the election law opens the gate to what may become a grave abuse by making federal office holders of a certain grade eligible to sit and vote. The special exception made is in the case of postmasters not receiving more than \$100 in yearly salary. The ever-ready plea is that such salary is too small to influence the independence of a representative. The basic principle of this defence is wrong and on a par with the defence of the mother of an illegitimate child, that the infant was only a very little one. The man who keeps a post office ought not to be in active politics at all. The patrons of the post office who belong to the opposing party cannot and will not give the same confidence in the office or the officer when once he becomes a party candidate as they could have if he held aloof from party interference in party struggles.

The innovation would tend to demoralise both the postal service and the Legislature. It is idle to say that a member would not be influenced in his vote by the danger of losing or the desire to hold on to a salary of \$100. That sum, small though it be, is practically two thirds of as much as a member receives in sessional indemnity. Let us suppose for a moment that the government had the power to deprive of their sessional indemnity all members but those who would support the Government. Where would be the independence of members

then? Doubtless there are men whom a hundred dollars, or five times that amount would not influence to vote against their convictions. There are others whom ten dollars would so influence. Office holders great or small should not sit in the Legislature. The innovation is uncalled for. It is unsafe. It is un-British. The Guardian records its protest against this provision as one that ought not to be entertained. Moreover we regard it as in the highest degree impolitic for the party in power to propose it. The people will justly regard it as an attempt to pack the House with office holders.

In a few years Canada has moved half a million people from the older provinces to the western prairies. The process has cost heavily; it has not added to the numbers.

Why the unsalaried City Councilors should be shut out of the Legislature and the salaried Postmasters let in is one of those things no fellow can understand.

The Legislature is the jury which pronounces upon the acts of the Government. No man should sit on that jury with Government money in his pocket, whether it be the money of the Provincial Government or the allied Government at Ottawa.

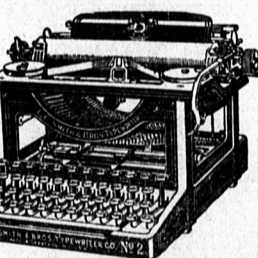
