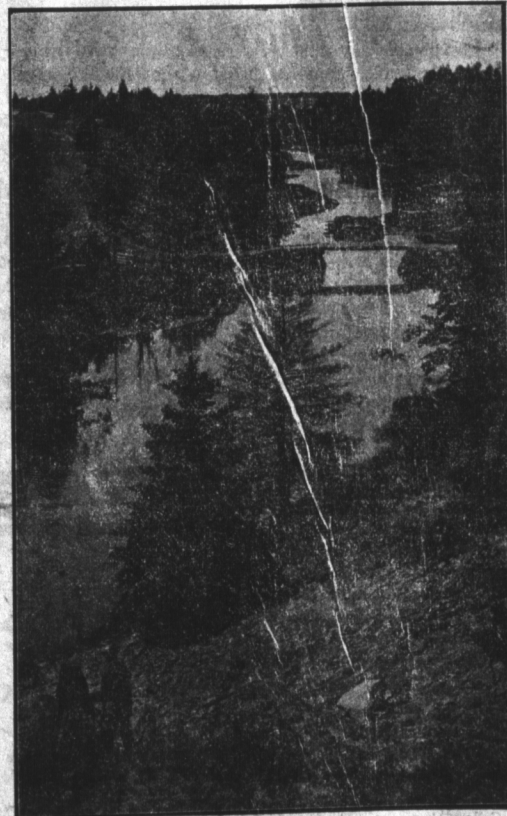
HEARST ENDORSED IN BOSTON

BULGARIA TELLS TURKEY TO HURRY

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 4.—The delay on the part of the Turkish commissioners to sign the report resulting from the inquiry into the frontier dispute regarding the delimitation of a portion of the vilayet of Adrianople, which led to a somewhat sharp fight recently between the soldiers guarding the Bulgarian post at Sujak and the guard on duty at the Turkish post of Dervish Moglis, has brought out practically an ultimatum from Bulgaria, in which that country declares that unless it is signed by October 15, the Bulgarian troops will be ordered immediately to occupy Sujak. The inquiry was concluded three weeks ago.

PARLIAMENT WILL MEET AT OTTAWA

Somewhat Later than Was Anticipated—May Be Ready By November 20—Fielding's Election Work Will Delay Matters—And Put Tariff Reform Behind.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7.—(Special)—It looks now as if Parliament would not open until a little later than was anticipated a month ago. The Cabinet planned to have the session begin on November 17, and, if possible, on November 7, but not later than Thursday, 22nd.

Oct. 7.—(Special)—Battered and bruised from contact with sticks and floating debris of the Petfordiac River floated beyond recognition by two weeks in water and eighth's weighted with many pounds of mud, the body of Albert J. Gorham, lost two weeks ago Saturday was recovered this afternoon.

RECORD OF LYNCH LAW IN STATES

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Four thousand negroes have been put to death without warrant of law in the United States in the last twenty-five years. Ninety-five per cent. of them were negroes charged with assaults on white women. The methods of execution comprised hanging, shooting, flogging, burning at the stake, stoning. In one instance in Arkansas the victim's arms and legs were twisted from their sockets. As a rule the more atrocious the crime the more atrocious the punishment.

RECORD MOUSE HEAD CAPTURED

FREDERICTON, N.B. Oct. 4.—Roy Robinson, son of Alex G. Robinson, of Marysville, shot a mouse at Youngs Brook, on the Nashwaak, on Saturday which, for breadth of antlers, is easily the largest of any monarch of the forest taken in the province this year. The head was brought out of the woods this afternoon and on being measured at Emacks Bros establishment, showed an antler spread of sixty-seven inches. The antlers are massive, of good formation, and carry twenty-six points. Mr. Robinson secured the prize seven miles from the settlement, and less than twenty-five miles from the city. He left his home at Marysville Saturday morning and got his mouse the same afternoon. The young man was accompanied by his father and Al X. Serville, and each member of the party shot a mouse.

COATES BROTHERS IN CANADA

PETERBORO, October 5.—This city has been speedily recuperated for the loss of the steel rolling mills industry. At a meeting of the city council last night, with the representatives of Messrs. Coates Brothers, Scottish manufacturers, an agreement was reached which provides that the firm is to establish in Peterboro the largest industry in Canada under one management. The Canadian company will be known as the Coates manufacturing company of Canada, Limited. Henry Coates, president, says he expects that within five years his industry will employ 5,000 hands, with a possibility of that number being doubled in the same period. At first carpets will be the staple output, and lithographing will be added, and other lines as obtained in the present establishment in Scotland.
