WILL CHANGE PASTORATE—It is pleasing to report that Rev. J. R. Skinner of Cornwall is making steady progress in health. Mr. Skinner intimated to the Official Board that he will seek a change of pastorate at end of June.

WEEK-END FIRES—Three grass fires—two on Ambrose Street and the other on York Lane—had the City firemen out Saturday. They were also called to a roof fire at the Vendome Hotel. Damage to the roof was slight.

TRUCK SMASHES HYDRANT—City Police about 10 o'clock Saturday night found a half-ton truck near the corner of Cumberland and Grafton Streets where it had run into and smashed a hydrant. The truck had been stolen from the Market Square some hours before. It is the property of William Rose, Mount Stewart.

Miss Margaret Jane Montgomery of Fort Hill, P. E. I., is celebrating her 101st birthday at her home today. She is living with a nephew, Major D. S. Montgomery, on the homestead where she was born and where she lived practically all her life.

The 3,700-ton Swedish diesel ship "B. O. Borjeson" docked at Georgetown yesterday afternoon to load potatoes for the United Kingdom. The ship ushered in the 1947 navigation season in this Province, one of the earliest openings on record.

The freighter was escorted into Georgetown by the Canadian Government icebreaker "Saurer" which was in the Strait of Canso. Very little ice was encountered, most of it near the Nova Scotia shore.

At a meeting Thursday of the committee appointed by the Dept. of Physical Fitness to award the Hawley Crockett Trophy for the most valuable player in his team in this year's play in the City Hockey League, it was unanimously decided to make the award to Carl MacDonal, outstanding S.D.U. athlete and this year's leading scorer for the league. Several other players were considered but on the strength of the number of games played, conduct on and off ice, scoring position, etc. the decision was unanimously made as above.

FIREMEN BUSY—Summer-side firemen had a busy day Saturday when they answered three calls. The first was about nine o'clock in the morning for an overheated stove pipe at the home of Mr. George Clow, Ottawa St. There was no damage. In the afternoon they were called out twice for grass fires. The first was on Argyle Street and the other a block away on Myrtle Street. Both of them were started by children and it is reported that some of them had a heavy hand vigorously applied to the part of their anatomy where it would do the most good when their parents were advised what they had been doing.—S.

Milford McAulay, 15, son of Mr. Louis McAulay, 129 King Street, and the late Mrs. McAulay, died at the Charlottetown Hospital about 4 o'clock yesterday morning as the result of a cycling accident the previous day.

The boy was cycling about 1.30 Saturday afternoon when, at the corner of Sydney and Great George Streets, the front wheel of his bicycle is said to have skidded. Thrown to the street on his head, the boy was taken home and medical aid summoned. He became unconscious about 7.30 p.m. and was removed to the hospital.

Besides his father, the late Milford McAulay is survived by four brothers: Clark, Loman, Elliott, and Francis; and four sisters: Alma, Florence, Jessie, and Carol Ann.

The housing shortage, which is becoming a serious problem in Summerside with the reopening of the airport, will be alleviated to some extent by a property deal which is expected to be concluded today. Negotiations are under way for the purchase by Mr. T.D. Morrison of the residential property of Mr. C.B. Morris, located on the corner of Spring and Prince Streets. If the deal goes through Mr. Morrison has plans for a large three-story brick and steel apartment building which will contain twenty apartments and will be built on the Prince Street side of the property. This will be by far the largest apartment building in town and probably the largest in the Province.

CAR BREAKS LIGHT POLES—At about 6.45 Saturday evening, a car travelling on Longworth Ave. left the pavement and clipped off two electric power poles and a tree before coming to rest on Mr. T.G. Ives' lawn at the corner of the avenue and Escher Street. Eye witness reports state that the car attempted to pass another car soon after crossing the railway track and went out of control. The driver, who is slightly injured, jumped along the avenue towards Weymouth Street on the run. The left hand front wheel of the vehicle broke off and ended up on a lawn on the opposite side of the road. The auto was owned and driven by an out-of-town man who later appeared at the Police Station reporting the car stolen and was placed under arrest. The car, a Hudson-Terrapain sedan (1936-37),

was badly damaged with the front section and the engine being a complete wreck. The accident caused a blackout in the area while linemen, who were on the job in a matter of minutes, repaired the damaged lines.
