THE PROHIBITORY LAW.

The resignation of Inspector Jenkins coupled with the fact that one of the violators of the Prohibitory law, convicted of a third offence, has been for days about the city and no attempt made to arrest him, is calculated to make the friends of the law inquire where they are at. Mr. Jenkins has from time to time expressed his conviction that the law can be effectively enforced if continuous and energetic action is taken to that end. His own good success during the time that he gave his service to this worthy object affords convincing evidence of his contention. But to effect the enforcement of the law efficient and zealous prosecutors must be kept at work and they must be paid.

No better man than Mr. Jenkins could probably be found for the work and the friends of law and order feel that his resignation is a public loss. He resigns because the Government will not pay him a sufficient salary to enable him to give his whole time to the work, and his entire time is obviously necessary to that end. Having collected in fines the sum of \$3,300 as Mr. Jenkins has done, it is natural that there should be surprise and regret among the friends of the law that a larger salary is not forthcoming. Why should not the money derived from the operation of the law be devoted to its enforcement? The legitimate object of the law is not the making of money but the suppression of the liquor traffic. If even half the fines were devoted to the carrying out of the law by means of prosecutors as zealous and capable as Mr. Jenkins it would prove nobly effectual.

What the Temperance Committee asked was that Mr. Jenkin's salary should be increased and his services retained. It was a most reasonable proposition, and beyond question it ought to have been accepted. It is impossible not to feel that if the Government were seriously desirous of having the law carried into effect and the liquor business in Charlottetown reduced to the smallest possible proportions they would have retained the services of the most efficient prosecutor available, and backed up his efforts to any reasonable extent with the money derived from fines. There was no question of depleting the provincial treasury. An energetic prosecutor is the means of collecting many times his salary, and this would continue till the traffic was effectually checked.

Under these circumstances the eyes of

the public turn with deep interest to the Government and especially to those members of it who have in the past made loud professions in regard to temperance and prohibition. In the large and general sense all members of the Government are bound to do all in their power to give the fullest effect to the law. But if there are divided counsels upon that point it is clearly the duty of men like Hon. Messrs. Rogers, Simpson and others to insist that the just expectations of the people shall not be disappointed. It will not do to play fast and loose with this question. To do so would be to forfeit the respect and support of the great majority of the electorate. The prohibition law is "the child of many prayers." Any attempt to wound it much less to strangle it would be met with stern and manly resentment. It is good politics as well as good morals to enforce the law. The public will know the attitude of every member of the Executive on the question, and that which is done in secret will in due time be proclaimed on the house tops.

In reference to the hotel project recently outlined in The Patriot on the suggestion of G. E. Hughes, M. L. A. we have grave doubts of the propriety of the City Council taking shares with a company in such an enterprise. We are not aware of any satisfactory precedents for such a course. Railway and steamship companies have frequently undertaken to build or assist in building hotels, and in some cases have undertaken the management as well. In such cases they derive a direct return for their investment. The city would doubtless profit by a first-class hotel if established here, but the gain would be indirect. The Plant Line, the Steam Navigation Company and the P. E. Island Railway would be the largest direct gainers from the stimulus to tourist traffic which a modern hotel would give. And there are obvious difficulties in the way of the city becoming a partner or a shareholder in such an enterprise.

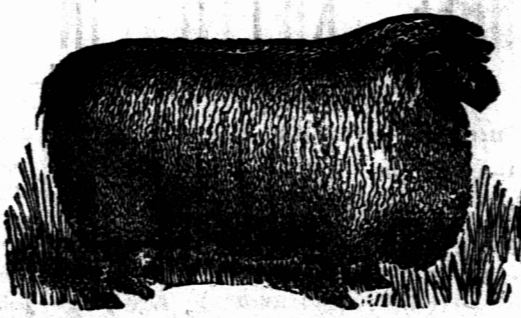
