Yanks Voted Outstanding Team In United States

(A.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Dec. 16 — While New York Yankees did it with their bats, experts, using ballots, selected the baseball champions as the No. one team of 1936 in the sixth annual Associated Press "ports poll."

For the fifth straight year, and the second time for the Yankees, the world series winner has been chosen by observers participating in the nationwide poll as sports' outstanding unit.

All told Joe McCarthy's ball players posted 194 points in contrast New York Giants, who were acclaimed the nation's leading team three years ago, polled only nine points despite their bristling comeback to win the National League banner.

Serving to confirm results of the final Associated Press ranking poll is the fact that the Yankees, which designated Minnesota as the country's no. one team, Bernie Bierman's burly boys gained a clear cut title to second place with 113 points. They were no. one on 18 lists although they were beaten for the first time in four seasons.

Third place was awarded the United States Olympic track and field team, which mopped up on the cinder path at Berlin.
