WAR SITUATION CAUSES MUCH ALARM

BOSTON, Nov. 12.—With the news of today of Italy weakened, the Germans within a few miles of Venice, with the boys on the streets tonight crying out "Kerensky ousted and Russia seeking peace", with Japan telling us that she can do nothing but protect the Pacific ocean from the German raiders, when she knows full well that there are no German raiders there—may we not fear a compact? With a solid vote of Russians, Germans, Japs and Chinese sweeping on ward, have we in America nothing to fear? The Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, asked these questions in his address before the Boston Baptist Social Union at Ford Hall last evening.

UNINFORMED OPTIMISTS

"We in America are uninformed optimists," he declared. "We are going on our way serenely, firmly confident that we cannot but win. Why not get the facts of the war. Why not learn the methods Germany is using to accomplish her great victories?" "We do not know anything about this war. The biggest men in this country do not understand it. You don't seem to realize that the American army must go into northern Italy. This country is going straight on toward an awful catastrophe. It will take a modern Bull Run to wake America up." "England is at last awake. England is working millions of women and girls day and night in ammunition factories." "We should have 6,000,000 girls in our ammunition factories. We should turn auto factories and plants for the production of unnecessary articles into ammunition plants. We are drifting along. Young men, give your lives; older men give every penny of your money to win this war. Everything in civilization goes, 1900 years of Christianity goes, if Germany wins this war."

BUGLE USED TO TRANSMIT MILITARY SIGNALS

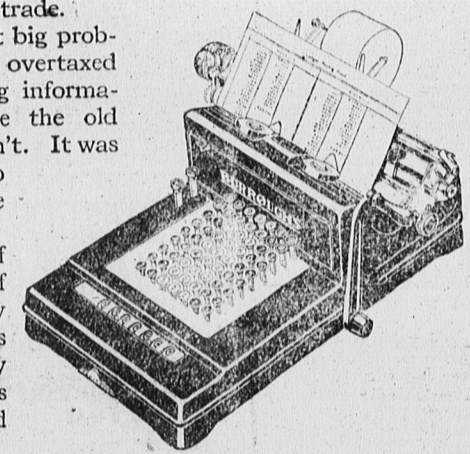

Reinforcements must be sent. We all know that voluntary enlistment can no longer keep up the supply required, and conscription has become necessary. The boys are watching eagerly for the result of this election. The whole world is watching the women of Canada. We must not fail. For how many years have women worked and struggled for the franchise? The great opportunity is before them now to add their men in the trenches and help win the war. Is there any patriotic work higher or nobler than this? A sign of the times, in connection with women and the vote, is the removal of the grille in the Ladies' Gallery of the House of Commons in England.
