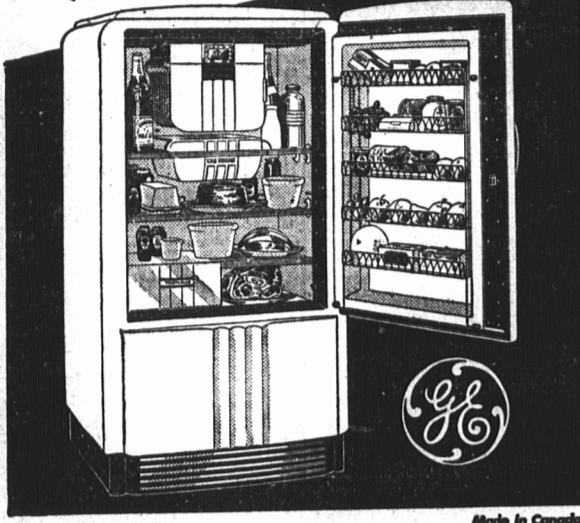

- 200 cords poles in 16 ft. lengths not less than 4 inches at small end.
- 200 piles in 17 ft. lengths not less than 8 inches at small end.
- 100 pieces 6" x 6" in 16½ ft. lengths.
- 200 pieces 2" x 5" in 16½ ft. lengths.
- 200 pieces 4" x 5" in 6 ft. lengths.

Parties tendering may tender for the whole or any portion thereof submitting a price per cord for poles, a price each for the piles and a price per M. B. M. for sawn lumber. Tenders to be marked, "Tenders for Material."

Poles and piles to be of spruce or fir, straight, well cleaned and sound.

Lumber to be spruce or hemlock, square edged, free from wane and shakes and sawn to the exact size specified.

All material to be inspected at the site and must be delivered on or before May 15, 1939.

In Memoriam

MR. AENEAS MURRAY
 The death occurred at Albany on March 27th of a most highly respected citizen in the person of Mr. Aeneas Murray in the 78th year of his age.
 Deceased had been in failing health since May, 1938, in January 1939 he entered the Prince County Hospital with the hope of regaining his usual good health, but nothing that medical skill could devise could stay the hand of death, and on the above mentioned date his soul returned to Him who gave it to receive its heavenly reward.
 Born at Albany 78 years ago Mr. Murray spent his entire life farming in this locality. He carried on his farm work on a very large scale, and through well-laid plans became one of the Island's most successful farmers and horsemen.
 His word was his bond, his home a haven for any who wished to call and spend a pleasant hour in his company.
 He was a strong supporter of the Conservative Party and all his efforts in political work were directed so as to better his fellowmen.
 In September 1938 he and his chosen life mate had the rare privilege of celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary.
 During his illness he was visited frequently by his pastor, Rev. M. J. Smith and Rev. W. E. Monaghan and died fortified by the last rites of the Catholic Church of which he was a very devoted member.
 He leaves to mourn, besides his sorrowing wife, four daughters and two sons, Mrs. W. K. Bassett, Mrs. Frank Murphy, Mrs. Levi Trainor, John, and Adrian; also his grand daughter Miss Mary Garland, to whom he gave more than a father's due; 24 grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.
 His funeral was held on Wednesday morning, March 29th, to St. Malachy's Church, Kinkora, and was followed by a concourse of cars and carriages over a mile in length. Funeral mass was sung by his pastor, Rev. M. J. Smith. Interment was made in the adjoining cemetery.
 Pall-bearers were: Geo. P. Trainor, Harry Ross, Geo. and William Sherry, Jas. and Fred Murray. Funeral arrangements were under the direction of his nephew Philip
