Funeral Services of Nelson Rattenbury Held Yesterday

Funeral of Mr. Nelson Rattenbury, 89-year-old Charlottetown business man who died Saturday was held yesterday from Trinity United Church of the People's Cemeteries. Services were conducted by the Rev. Hugh Miller, pastor of Trinity Church, and Rev. Lewis Murray, co-pastor, assisted by Venerable Archbishop H. D. Raymond of St. Paul's Anglican Church. Rev. Mr. Murray conducted service at the graveside.

Honorary pallbearers were: Lieut.-Governor George D. DeBlois, and Messrs. R. E. Mutch, Charles Toombs, Gordon Avar, and Reginald Aitken.

Active pallbearers were: Messrs. E. T. Higgs, D. J. Riley, B. Roy Holman, K. M. Martin, J. A. Parquharson and Hon. B. W. LePage.

Following were the mourners, Messrs. John Rattenbury, Arnold Rattenbury, Harry Winchester, Nelson Rattenbury, James Caldwell, Geo. Read, Rev. K. M. Murray, James Rattenbury, David Read, Herbert Pletch and David Caldwell.

Rev. Mr. Miller, in the funeral sermon, based his remarks on 2 Tim. 1:12 "I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day."

Concerning the deceased Rev. Mr. Miller said: "The late Nelson Rattenbury was one of the oldest residents of this city and a member of this church. It is not for me to refer to length to his life. He did not desire it. For many years, he was active in the commercial and social life of this city and province, and his ability and faithfulness were recognized by his fellow-citizens. He was highly regarded for his integrity, friendliness and thoughtfulness. He held strong convictions and he honoured the convictions of others. He was one of the most approachable of men, and one was immediately set at ease by his gentleness and quiet dignity. He knew property and adversity. The faith he professed sustained him throughout the years. He knew and he was convinced. After many years, he fell asleep, leaving the memory of a gentle spirit, an affectionate father and a worthy citizen."

Electrification Of Rural Areas Subject Of Film

An interested group saw a motion picture "Rural Electrification" shown at the Charlottetown Hotel, (formerly the Canadian National) last night. The film, shown here under the auspices of the Maritime Electric Company was produced by the General Electric of the United States and gave a graphic picture of farming under old methods and under a new system, with electricity doing most of the tedious work.

Mr. V. A. Ainsworth, manager of the Maritime Electric, presided. He explained his company was anxious to extend lines to rural communities as rapidly as possible but at present only about 20 per cent of the population would take immediate advantage of facilities offered, although most would indicate their intention to have their properties electrified at some future date.

Following showing of the picture Mr. Ainsworth invited comment and criticism from members of the audience. Rev. Dr. J. A. Murphy, Dr. G. D. Steel and Mr. P. E. Palmer spoke briefly commending the picture.

The program was arranged through Mr. G. Wilson of Halifax, Canadian General Electric representative.

Those attending last night's showing of the picture included electricians, contractors, and those interested in youth training.
