T. A. Benson, recently in the employ of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, has been appointed by the Dominion Government to extend and foster the poultry industry in Prince Edward Island. Mr. Benson is now in Charlottetown in conference with the Department of Agriculture preparatory to entering upon his duties. He is a native of England and came to Canada ten years ago. He has been in the poultry business since boyhood and knows practically all there is to know about it. On coming to Canada he took charge of a winter broiler plant near Montreal and made a success of it. After a few years in this business he took a course in the McDonald Agricultural College where eventually he was given charge of the practical class work of the students, conducting the investigation and research work. Later he was engaged by the Ontario Government to conduct extension work in the County of Ontario. Here also success crowned his efforts, the county having been thoroughly organized and is now looked upon as having the most successful poultry business in Canada. It is with the intention of doing similar work in Prince Edward Island that he has now been engaged by the Dominion Government.

AN ENGLISH CHRISTENING. (By "Savina.")

The largest private house in the United Kingdom is said to be Wentworth Woodhouse, the principal seat of Earl and Countess Fitzwilliam, near Rotherham, Yorkshire. The splendid mansion measures 200 yards in length, and it is stated that there is sufficient space for a hundred and twenty guests to sit down with comfort at dinner or luncheon in the dining-room. For the shooting large parties were entertained here during the past month, and it is to be hoped that some of the visitors found themselves in the plight of many former guests of whom amusing stories are told of their wandering about, having lost their way in the numerous rooms and corridors of the huge house. One of these was the famous Baron von Liebig, who, with a carelessness not altogether surprising in this great authority on chemistry, dropped wafers from a box, thus forming a trail by which he could be discovered if he lost his bearings.

Lady Fitzwilliam is a niece of the Countess of Bradford, for her mother (the Marchioness of Zetland) was the third of the Earl of Scarborough's four sisters, Lady Bradford being the second. All these four Ladies Lumley married before their 22nd birthday,

all are now living, and all four have for some years been grandmothers. Countess Fitzwilliam was married on Midsummer Day, 1896, and she had four daughters before her little son was born at the end of 1910. The advent of this son, and heir was of course the occasion of great rejoicing, and long will the tale be told in the West Riding of the doings at his christening. Entertainments on an enormous scale took place at Wentworth Woodhouse in Feb. 1911, and a scarf of great historical interest was worn by the infant at his baptism. This remarkable relic is said to have been given by the Conqueror to the Fitzwilliam who fought under him and who always wore the scarf on his sleeve in battle. As a reward for his bravery he also obtained the land upon which Wentworth Woodhouse now stands, and which in the neighbourhood has been developed into a vast colliery district that has added immensely to the great wealth of the Fitzwilliams.

So it was that the christening day was kept as a holiday by the miners and their families, and from the villages around thirteen thousand of them came as guests to Wentworth, besides seven thousand others who had been invited. To cater for this huge gathering a special train from London brought 300 waiters, with 40 tons of food, and cutlery and china; and great was the feasting upon the refreshments provided, which included 17,000 sandwiches, 30,000 buns, 29,000 meat patties, 5 tons of bread and cake, and more than 20,000 gallons of beverages, besides other smaller items, and the ox roasted whole, which is a feature of such festive occasions.

Little Viscount Milton, the hero of this particular occasion, was then but five or six weeks old, and while

outside there was this great assembly of 20,000 people, who had come to congratulate Earl and Countess Fitzwilliam, he lay sleeping in the great mansion, as a healthy, well-brought-up, infant should.

One of his ancestors, by the way, was the great Lord Stafford, who was beheaded on Tower Hill, and his phoet, carrying its head in its hands, is said to haunt Wentworth Woodhouse. A daughter of the 2nd Baron Fitzwilliam married the celebrated architect, Sir Christopher Wren, from whom was descended the late Mrs. C. F. Figgott, formerly of Edmond Rectory.

MARKET RUN BY WOMEN.

WINNIPEG, September 27.—A sample vegetable market being operated here this week at the industrial bureau, under the management of the committee of women in an endeavor to reduce the prices charged at the general market, and by retailers throughout the city has already had the effect of bringing down the prices on vegetables from one third to one half in many cases. The producers are bringing the goods directly to the market and selling directly to the consumers. It is claimed an understanding exists at the general market for keeping prices at high mark.

MESSINA VOLCANO IS IN ERUPTION.

MESSINA, Sept. 27.—The volcano Stromboli is again in eruption. Cinder cones and incandescent sand are being ejected from nine craters and dust is falling in quantities over the surrounding country and the outlying islands. Vineyards and crops generally are suffering heavily.
