The death occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. James Dennis, No. 73 Douglas Street, Charlottetown, of Mr. James McRae, of French River. The deceased who had been visiting hotel, daughter, passed away after a brief illness, on Saturday December 15th. The late Mr. McRae was a man of sterling character and was much respected by all who knew him. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. James McRae, four daughters and five sons: viz: Mrs. James McLeod, Clifton; Mrs. E. Gillespie, Clifton; Miss Jean McRae, Clifton; Mrs. James Dennis, Charlottetown; William, Wilfrid, and Charles of French River; John and Stinson, soldiers in France. The remains were conveyed to French River on Saturday and the interment took place at Clifton, Rev. Mr. Sterling officiating.

MRS. OLIVER W. ANDERSON

One of the wisest known and most highly respected men in Prince County passed away on Saturday evening, in the person of Mr. William Kennedy of O'Leary. F., were held at O'Leary and the remains followed by a concourse of 500 people, were conveyed to the railway station, and taken by train to Bradalbane. ALEXANDER STEVENSON

On Tuesday, Dec. 11th, there passed into the presence of its Master and Saviour, the spirit of one of Cornwall's most respected citizens, Alexander Stevenson. 

A STRONG PLEA FOR MEN

The following letter received by Eva McLaren, Cable Head from her brother Edgar tells the need of men at the front. He has served for 12 months at the front, and has been in the Hospital for two months suffering from rheumatism. His many friends are glad to hear that he is getting better.

Canadian Convalescent Hospital, England
Dec. 5, 1917

Dear Sister:—Received your letter last night. I am being shifted about some of the time you see, been here two weeks, and expect to go to Buxton soon. This is more of a camp than a Hospital. It's a fine looking place, its a large mansion and estate, belonging to some rich guy that went broke and the Canadian Government took it over for a Hospital. Its a big building about 5 stories high and covers about 2 acres or more. The grounds around the mansion are lovely, nice gardens, walks, drives, lakes, etc. It must be nice in summer. It is not so nice this time of year, although at present the weather is pretty fine, cold and clear. Well Eva I sure had a nice time while in Wigan, after I got up and able to go out. The people about there are awfully nice I was out to tea most every day. The nurses, there were sure fine, well Eva we had some excitement here over the Canadian election and war loan, most all the boys voted for Conscriptio, and believe me its the only thing to do, for if we dont get reinforcements soon and lots of them, we'll all be out of it. We will all be killed off and nothing to show for it, for you see if we don't keep up to strength, we have to stay in line longer, and do the fighting that the slackers should be doing. If the slackers were sent over there would be some chance for some one to get back, but if not I am afraid none of us will ever see Canada unless its the cripples who get discharged. Even the French fellows all vote for the Union Government. All the Canadian Nurses and sisters have a vote too, and I think all you Canadian girls have a vote haven't you? We voted over a year ago for the Women's rights in Canada. I hope you people voted the right way. I know the old notion that prevails in the ast, that one should vote for a certain party and stick to it. That's all rot. No broad minded person would have such an idea. Its a rut that eastern people have been in for years and its time they climbed out and did a little thinking for themselves.

As for the war loan I think its a real good investment I took one hundred dollars worth of war bonds and put it in your name, I guess you know all about it. I need not explain Well I must ring off. Received parcel some time ago many thanks. Love to all. As ever,
