ANOTHER daring and dastardly robbery was committed in the city last Saturday night. A valuable mare in foal from Admiral Dewey, owned by Hector C. McLeod and kept at his stables to the rear of the Central Christian Church, Kent Street, was taken from the stable by some unknown parties. The stable adjoining occupied by Reaney Gay was first broken into and a bridle secured. The stable of Mr. McLeod was next entered, the staples being drawn and the animal taken away. It is supposed that the theft was committed about eleven o'clock as people in the neighborhood heard some noise at the stable about that time. When Mr. McLeod came around in the morning he found the animal at the door dripping wet, evidently from exposure in the heavy rain and from all appearances the mare had been ridden hard during the night. As a result of the ill usage the animal prematurely dropped the foal and is in a critical condition. There is as yet no clue to the guilty parties. It is hoped that anyone who can give any information in the matter will see Mr. McLeod as it is necessary for the protection of all citizens, property that the culprit be discovered and punished to the severest extent of the law.
