A PROBLEM FOR IRISHMEN.—Westminster Gazette: These terrible outbreaks in districts where Sinn Feiners and Unionists live in close connection demonstrate how great a part of the Irish problem is Irish first and last. The English cannot solve it for them, though they can make its solution easier or more difficult. No Sinn Feiner can argue, in face of these events, that British rule is the only barrier between Ireland and her peace. Nor, in view of the fact that the worst disturbances have taken place in Ulster itself, can any Ulsterman maintain that his province is compact and uninfluenced by political conditions in the rest of Ireland. RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.—We believe that a certain amount of fundamental religious instruction should be given in our schools. At the present time we believe this is impossible, at we would like to see a few guides to our children posted in every room of the schools throughout the Province. For instance we think no higher ideals could be set before our children than that contained in the following: "My duty towards my neighbour, is to love him as myself, and to do to all men, as I would they should do unto me; To love, honour, and succour my father and mother: To honour and obey the King, and all that are put in authority under him: To submit myself to all my governors, teachers, spiritual pastors and masters: To order myself lowly and reverently to all my betters: To hurt nobody by word or deed: To be true and just in all my dealings: To bear no malice nor hatred in my heart: To keep my hands from picking and stealing, and my tongue from evil speaking, lying and slandering: To keep my body in temperance, soberness, and chastity: not to covert nor desire other men's goods, but to learn and labour truly to get mine own living, and to do my duty in that state of life unto which it shall please God to call me." Although the above is from the Prayer Book of the Church of England, we do not think it can be in any way called sectarian. Therefore we suggest to our school authorities that it be printed in large type and a copy posted up in every school throughout the province. If we can teach the young their duty to their neighbour, we will go a long way towards bringing them up in the way we would wish them to go.

OPPOSE ELECTION.—The Army and Navy Veterans passed a resolution taking issue with veteran's organizations which have been urging an early Dominion general election, and claiming that the present is not a time for a general election. The resolution in question also claims that the present gratuities and pensions are, on the whole, generous, and that they will probably be added to later by the Government.

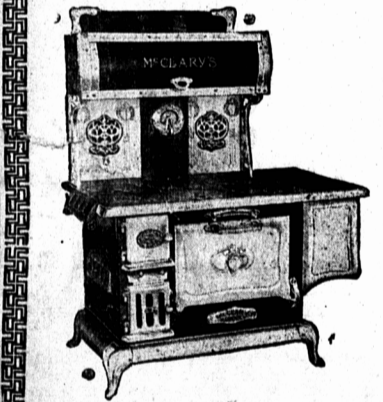

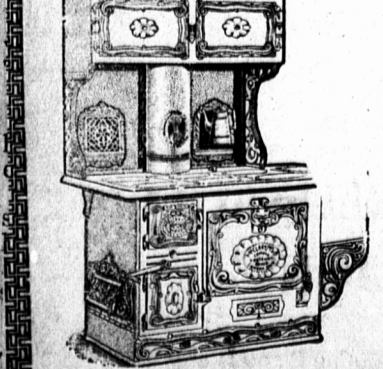
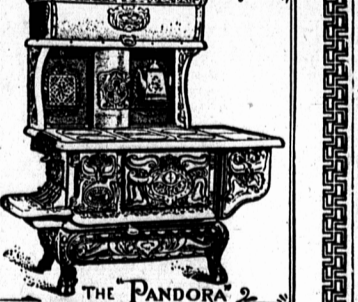
