Miss Fennessey gave a very graphic account of what she observed during her short visit, and left those present with the idea that the schools of that University City are on a high plane of excellence. The paper was followed by an animated discussion and to several questions Miss Fennessey gave graphic replies. At the close Miss Fennessey was tendered a vote of thanks.

PRESBYTERIAN WITNESS.—We thank Judge Forbes for his strong, severe and thoroughly sensible remarks before the St. John Grand Jury on the Boxing Bout that caused the violent death of a young man. He denounced the "bout" as a prize fight. The homicide he regarded as a case of manslaughter. VONCLURE GAY and F. J. Holman have chartered the schooner W. E. Young. She goes to North River Bridge on Wednesday and will be loaded with a general cargo of produce for the Cape Breton market.

CHARLES PIKE, who won the shot put here in the September athletic sports and was on the Abegweit track team to Halifax at the Maritime Championships, is playing right wing on the Swarthmore College football team.

THE S.S. City of London started for Crapaud yesterday morning but only got as far as St. Peter's Island, when owing to the thick weather outside she returned. She sailed again at nine o'clock for Orwell and returns this morning.

JAMES MULLALLY, a respected farmer of Morell Rear, took suddenly ill Sunday afternoon and died two hours later. He had been in very good health right up to that time. He was a man about sixty years of age and leaves a wife and two children.

MAYNARD McDONALD, Montague, received a despatch yesterday from Gloucester, Mass., stating that the James McDonald who was drowned from the schooner Stranger as recorded in The Guardian yesterday morning was not his brother, but a man of his same name.

EGGS are now quoted at 20 cents in Charlottetown and the price here has advanced to 22 cents. Supplies are light and markets on both sides of the water firm. The riots in Russia have prevented supplies from that country coming forward to the English market, and prices there are accordingly firm. Montreal exporters are doing their utmost to ship as many as possible before the close of navigation.—Halifax Chronicle.

A MERCHANT from Prince Edward Island arrived by a late train on Saturday evening and was driven to the Queen Hotel. After registering he was allotted a room. Before retiring he went across the street to a restaurant. On returning he went to his room, which was dimly lighted, and started to undress, when he observed that it was occupied. He put on the clothes he had taken off and made a hasty exit, and sought his own hotel.—Halifax Herald.

THE death took place in Sydney last week of Frederick Moseley, for twenty years Stipendiary Magistrate of that city and law partner of H. P. Duchemin, formerly of Charlottetown. Of him the Sydney Post says:—The unexpected news came as a great shock to his friends in the city. He only returned a few days ago from a visit to New York, and appeared to be in his usual health. On Wednesday last, he went to the International Pier on business. On Thursday he was confined to the house under medical treatment. He quickly developed pneumonia and pleurisy, and passed away, as stated above.

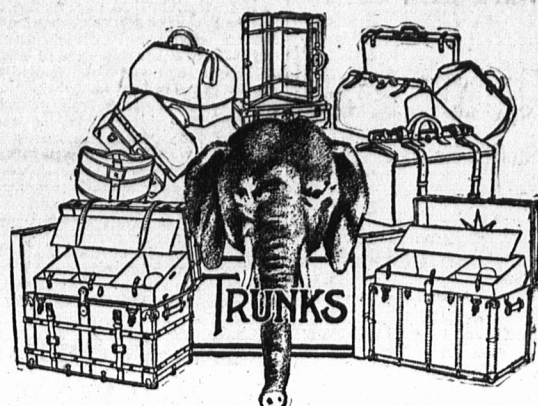

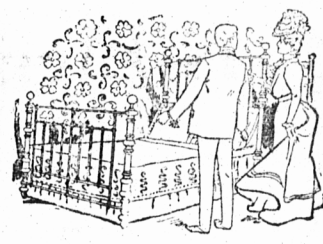
