THE VALUE OF A GOOD DOCTOR.

Forty odd years ago a young doctor set up his office in a village of a neighboring Province and rapidly acquired a practice in the village and surrounding settlements. From one of these settlements two young men had then recently paid a visit to St. John, and after their return had become ill. No one knew or suspected what their disease was till the doctor was called. He without hesitation pronounced their cases smallpox, much to the alarm of themselves, their neighbors and friends. One of the patients was the eldest son in a family of ten, the other a master mechanic boarding in the family of a widow with a family of young children.

In those days there were no local boards of health and, of course there was no hospital near. These patients must be treated in their homes, but the young doctor was equal to the emergency. He immediately, vaccinated every person in the two families, gave minute instructions as to the care of the sick ones, and the measures to be taken to prevent the spread of the malady, and insisted with firmness on every necessary precaution being taken. The two cases progressed to ultimate recovery the one quite quickly, while the other, which nearly proved fatal, was of a tedious nature. Not another case of smallpox developed from these two, and there has not since occurred a case of this dread disease in that locality. Of course it may be said the doctor did no more than his duty, but he was very young in his profession and all admitted that he did his duty well and with the most fortunate results.

Nowadays we have many doctors for the few we had then, while boards of health have increased and hospitals have also increased in number. But in the same Province of New Brunswick successive epidemics of smallpox have occurred each springing from isolated cases in the first place, which were diagnosed by local physicians as chickenpox. These have caused a vast deal of suffering, a number of deaths and have cost the Province thousands of dollars. Today smallpox is planted in many houses of a locality in central New Brunswick and bids fair to become a sweeping conflagration, and all because the doctors first called in, wrongly decided that the disease was chickenpox. The contrasts between these incidents and that first introduced above will be apparent to every one. This contrast accentuates the importance and value of preventive measures. It also brings into relief the value of the skilled and capable physician who does not make mistakes, as compared with the unskilled and incapable who seem to be too much in evidence in the country districts of the sister Province.

The Toronto World boldly asserts that almost every trade journal in Canada is either the special organ of one or more trade combines, or is controlled by them.

An Ottawa paper commenting on the unseating of a member of the Ontario Legislature remarks that with energetic effort it would be quite possible to unseat ninety-nine out of a hundred members elected. In other words only one per cent of the hundred of representatives in the Commons and Provincial Legislatures have been lawfully elected. With this intimation of widespread corruption at the polls—the basis of our political system—and with the salary grab at the top, what a rotten condition of things is apparent!

The Ottawa Free Press, home organ of the Laurier government, and which for a time leaned toward higher protection, now concludes that some of the manufacturers are wishing they had not agitated for a change. "It would almost seem," says the Free Press, "that when the matter of tariff changes comes up for consideration in the Commons there will have to be more decreases than increases." The farmers in the West have made their influence felt before the Tariff Commission and this should encourage our eastern farmers, to stand to their guns against any increase of the tariff.

STATE TELEPHONE SERVICE.

The Roblin Government in Manitoba announce the intention to establish and operate a public telephone system in that Province, in order to give the people in town and country the benefit of competition and lower rates. The only objection so far taken to this proposal seems to be that the Manitoba Government is forestalling the intended action of the Dominion Government. It is well known that Sir William Mulock favored a state telephone system to be worked in connection with the postal service. It remains to be seen whether Postmaster General Aylesworth will adopt the views of his predecessor in office on that question.

The feeling in favor of Maritime union is apparently much more prevalent in the non-Maritime Provinces than in those which might be supposed to be more immediately concerned. Why should Ontario and Quebec concern themselves about this matter? They got married somewhere about 1840 and before ten years were crying for a divorce, which they obtained in 1867. Their example in that regard is not altogether alluring to the Provinces by the sea.

Sir Richard Cartwright some years ago illustrated the case of the farmers in relation to high protection by the following anecdote. A farmer dreamed that he had visited the infernal regions and had there seen in one cavern a number of objects hung from the roof like sides of bacon. When he made inquiry what these objects were he was informed they were farmers who had been so green as to believe in protection and had to be dried before they would burn.

The Toronto News, an independent journal, of wide and growing influence, which did a great deal towards effecting the defeat of the Ross Government, has now turned against the Whitney Government which it aided to bring into power. And for a very good reason. The Government has dismissed the Chief Inspector of Licenses for Toronto, an efficient officer, apparently in order to appoint a Conservative party man in his place. In thus applying the spoils system the Whitney Government acted against the wishes of the License Commissioners appointed by said Government, and these Commissioners promptly resigned. The News has been quite consistent in its opposition to the wrongdoing of successive Governments, and like The Guardian has been sometimes denounced for Conservative and sometimes for alleged Liberal leanings.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district, in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. Deputy of the Minister of the Interior, 9-15d6mo
