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Legion Resentful Of Political Use

President's Warning Follows Report of Veteran's Speech—Pensions Question.

TORONTO, July 15.—"Any attempt made by politicians, either from the political platform or through the press, to use the Canadian Legion politically, will be keenly resented by members of the Canadian Legion."

The above quotation concluded a letter issued yesterday by the Ontario Command of the Canadian Legion over the signature of Alex. Shields, secretary, and at the request of Col. C. H. Ackerman, president.

It followed immediately upon reports that Captain C. P. Gilman, M. C., president of the Tubercular Veterans' Association of the Canadian Legion, had taken the platform in support of M. N. Cummings, Liberal candidate in Carleton County, and discussed, in the course of his address, a "secret" of the pension legislation passed by the King Government. The letter urges avoidance of injecting the legion into the election fight.

Speech Is Quoted.

According to reports received yesterday, Captain Gilman took the platform in support of Mr. Cummings and stated:

"I am letting out a secret when I say this, but the Conservatives have been claiming that bill 19 (the amendments to the Pension Act) is the result of their efforts. Let me tell you that the bill was made up right in our office and before it ever came before Parliament, the King Government assured us that it would be put through."

Legion Officials Amazed.

Officials of the Legion and of the Tubercular Veterans' Association expressed amazement last night at the report, and to verify their declarations to avoid taking any part in politics produced a copy of Col. Ackerman's letter, instructions for the distribution of which to all posts had apparently been issued only a few hours before Captain Gilman spoke. The complete letter, which is addressed to all branch secretaries and Legion executives, follows:

I have been requested by our provincial president, Col. C. H. Ackerman, to forward the following statement made by him at a recent rally held in Windsor, Ontario:—

"The approaching Federal election, with the views of the different political parties being freely discussed, makes it necessary for the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League to again emphasize the fact that we are a non-political organization and that the policy of the Canadian Legion is one of non-participation."

"Already the legislation affecting ex-service men and their dependents, passed by Parliament during the last session, has been injected into the campaign.

"For the guidance of all members, it must be remembered that that legislation was passed as a result of some years of very careful consideration on the part of all ex-soldier organizations of our problems, and of their successful submission to Parliament by the Canadian Legion.

"The proposals were so carefully prepared and submitted to the special parliamentary committee on pensions that they were passed on to Parliament and the Senate and unanimously adopted.

"Any and all efforts made by our members towards the successful introduction of this legislation is only in accordance with our constitution.

"It must be borne in mind, however, that we have a responsibility towards our country apart from any legislation that might be of direct benefit to ourselves or to dependents, and for that reason and in accordance with our constitution, all members must be made to feel that they must not as private citizens be deprived of their rights by virtue of

their membership in the Canadian Legion from contributing during the forthcoming campaign, their own personal views.

"Cannot Believe" Report.

Interviewed at his home, 7 Oakview Avenue, W. G. Clark, who was the Toronto delegate to the Tubercular Veterans' Convention at Regina at which Bill 19 was drawn, said: "I have only just returned from Ottawa, and I positively cannot accept that despatch as accurate. I cannot believe it, nor that Captain Gilman is correctly quoted, nor that he appeared on that platform in any other than a private capacity, if at all. I cannot believe it, as Captain Gilman has been one of the hardest workers for tubercular veterans for many years, and at the same time as giving his time to the work, he is a very sick man."

"Bill 19 was thrashed out and brought before the Dominion convention at Regina last November. I was there as delegate from the city of Toronto. The bill was then taken to Ottawa and a committee appointed, and after very lengthy and conscientious consideration by a parliamentary committee representing all political parties the measure was put through.

Against Constitution.

"I personally would not consider taking any part in this political fight as representing our section of the Tubercular Veterans' Association. It is absolutely against the constitution of the Tubercular Veterans' section of the Canadian Legion for the name of our section to be used politically.

"We are entirely dependent upon the government, no matter what party forms that government; whatever government is in office we hope will continue to improve conditions for the unfortunate men who are unable to establish claims to a pension, and I think I am speaking for most members of our section when I say we are not so much interested in who is elected, as in the fact that we have a great many men who have active tuberculosis and who are not receiving any pension, nor any allowance of any description."
