**Harry Hopkins Back From Moscow**

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—Harry Hopkins returned from Moscow today and reported immediately to President Truman on his talks with Marshal Stalin which have been credited with improving Russo-American relations. The President's emissary had no comment for reporters as he stepped down the stairs but smiling, from the army transport plane that brought him from Paris. Mr. Truman is scheduled to discuss Russian-American relations at his news conference tomorrow.

### One Woman In New House Of Commons
