The pallbearers were six grandchildren of the deceased; Wallace and Charles Adams, Roland and Charles Champion and Irving and Harold Champion. Interment was in the Church of England Cemetery at Irishtown. —S

—TASCHEREAU KNOCKS FARM MARKETING BILL (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) QUEBEC, April 23.—No worse blows have been aimed at Canadian farmers than the spirit that prevailed at, and resulted in Confederation, than Dominion Government legislation in regard to the proposed Marketing Bill and the 10 percent levy on gold as announced in the House of Commons in the budget presented by Hon. R. M. Rhodes, Minister of Finance, Premier L. A. Taschereau, of Quebec, declared in a statement issued here tonight.

—He wanted it clearly understood, he said, he was not taking Dominion Government affairs out of any other consideration but that which gave him ground for belief the Dominion Government was proceeding upon provincial rights. The proposed Marketing Bill, he thought, would see the Dominion Government assume control of Quebec's mines, fisheries and all natural products. The imposition of the gold tax he saw as a further Dominion Government move to take away what belongs essentially to the provinces. Quebec had considered increasing the royalty on gold but had refrained when shown an increase in taxation would cause harm to the industry.

—DALHOUSIE WIFE CHAMPIONSHIP (By The Canadian Press) HALIFAX, April 24.—Dalhousie University's first women's basketball team won the Maritime Championship this year. This is the first time a Halifax team has won the title in more than a decade. Halifax Wanderers led by Ritchie McGee, won the title 11 years ago.

—SWALLOW ARRIVE AT BRIDGE TOWN, N. S. April 24.—Bird Haven reported the arrival of the first tree-swallow approximately two weeks earlier than any known record of the northward migration of these birds in the province.

—SHORT RADIO WAVES DRIVE EAST. ROTOR. BRIDGE TOWN, N.S., April 24.—Radio driven and controlled transportation is probable in the near future after what was termed a successful test in driving a rail motor by short radio waves.

—The car, a four wheeled vehicle constructed from two hand cars loaded with eight men and equipped with complicated electrical apparatus, rolled over a 7 mile stretch of the Santa Fe right of way with no material connection between it and the radio transmitter from which it derived its power.

—Following the installation of larger equipment, generating 1,000 watts and capable of driving a five car train the test will be resumed.

Sailors Ingenuity Cheats Raging Sea

—Four men saved their lives by leaping from a steamer struggling through a boiling sea, and climbing the two-hundred-foot cliffs of a tiny uninhabited island. They were the skeleton crew of the old Bibby liner Heretfordshire. For years the ship was lying idle in the River Dart. Then she was sold to be broken up. She set out for the Clyde in tow of a tug. The sea became heavy and she put into Plymouth. She left. Storms battered her every day. The tug could make only slow progress. Then the rope parted and the old liner drifted helplessly in the Irish Sea. She struck the rocks of Cardigan Island, a rugged spot of only thirty-five acres off the Cardigan-shire coast.

—Heavy seas battered her, and in twenty minutes she was holed on both sides. The forecastle fell with a crash. The ship took a heavy list. The four men realized that they were in grave danger. They made a bid for their lives. Lashing themselves together with a long rope, they jumped into the wild sea.

—Eventually they got ashore and found themselves at the foot of the island's 200-foot cliffs.

—Up they went. There was little foothold, but two of the men, who reached exposed spots, and finally they arrived at the top and crossed to the leeward side of the island. There they climbed down the cliff again.

—Frenzied busy crew had been waiting on the mainland for hours and they fired a rope across. A few minutes later the men were hoisted over the rocks and through the sea.

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
