Halifax Herald on Abbie-Crescent game, played Monday night. In a game that was replete in sensational playing and abundant in brilliant team work, clean playing and great net guarding, the Abegweits rubber hunters, of Charlottetown, hockey champions of the Maritime Provinces, ran out ahead of the Crescents last evening at the local Arena and captured the first exhibition game against local teams by a 4 to 3 score. To say that the game was a thriller is putting it mildly, and the twenty hundred fans who were kept in an uproar by sensational rushes, Crescents, strengthened by the appearance of Fabie Bates and Montie Haslam, of Dalhousie, put up a great argument against the champions and were outplaying the local team in the second half, ending a hard fought contest. The Abbies had a good advantage on the locals in territory in the first period but the Crescents came back in the second session and outplayed the Islanders, although they were unable to score a goal. Cyril Hanrahan, net guardian of the local, put up a great exhibition of rubber hunting in the nets and saved his team time after time with sensational saves. When an Island player secured the puck at centre ice he was at once joined by two of his team mates and the three forwards swept down on the local pad artist giving him no chance to clear, but the cool goalie came out of his nets to clear the rubber by diving after the disc.

PARIS, Jan. 15.—One hundred and fifty-six athletes will represent France in the track and field events July 5 to 12 the "big week" of the 1924 Olympic games, according to the progress of elimination and selection trials announced by the French Athletic Federation. All the clubs affiliated with the Federation have been asked to designate men to compete in the general elimination trials, which will take place in every city of any importance in France during the first fortnight in April. From these will be selected provincial teams to participate in the final elimination and selection events to be held in Paris, Colombes Stadium, April 20; Pershing Stadium May 4 and 18. The athletes chosen for the games will be placed under the immediate supervision of trainers and sent to Paris for a special training course until early July. There is some talk of assembling the men selected at the Joinville School for Physical Culture—some five miles from Paris—keeping them there from June 15 until the first starting pistol is fired on July 5 at the Colombes Stadium.

ST JOHN, Jan. 15.—Clubs under the jurisdiction of the M. P. B. A. U. of Canada holding sport meets and requiring the services of any individual contestant, from an outside club shall make application for the services of this player through the club with which the athlete is registered and the club in turn will seek sanction from the amateur representative of that particular district. This is the gist of a bulletin issued here today by P. J. Legge, secretary-treasurer of the M. P. B. A. U. of Canada. Championship meets of course, do not come under this ruling.

MONTREAL, Jan. 15.—Manager Dandurand of the Canadiens announced that after returning to Montreal last night, Billy Couju had his arm X-rayed and it developed that the Toronto injury will keep him out of hockey for several weeks. Couju, Noble and Corbeau collided when the two Toronto players tried to stop Couju, and in falling Couju broke his wrist. Manager Dandurand stated that he had not yet decided who he would play in Couju's place on the defence.
