Objectives For Island Farmers For Next Year

Prince Edward Island farmers will have to "raise their sights" next year as they are to hit production targets set at the recent Dominion-Provincial conference of agricultural leaders at Ottawa.

Arrests made during the year 1942 by the City Police Force totaled 421, Chief of Police A. Birtwistle reports in a review of the year's activities.

These were apparently more active in 1942 than they were in the previous 12-month period. Arrests on this charge for the year number 18 as compared with 14 in 1941.

Offences for which arrests were made and the number of prisoners charged on each count were as follows: Assault, 15; Drunks, 318; False Pretences, 1; Recent Act, 2; Theft, 18; Liquor on person, 3; Vagrancy, 30; Breaking and entering, 7; Insanity, 12; Juvenile delinquency, 2; Mischief, 1; Obstruction of officer, 1; Obnoxious language, 1; Traffic Act, 1; Robbery with violence, 1; Homicide, 1; Non-support, 1; Total, 421.

Sheep and lambs: For Canada the increase required is 9 per cent, for Prince Edward Island 5 per cent over last year.

Considerable expansion took place in hatching capacity early in the year 1942 in preparation for the expected heavy demand.

Another important development in marketing machinery was the installation of several mechanical plucking machines for poultry together with adequate cooling facilities.

Outlook For 1943 The program for this Province is to assist New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to supply their provincial requirements of both eggs and poultry.

Appreciation of the value of this industry to the farm program can be had by considering that the selling value of eggs alone for 1942 is estimated at \$1,500,000.

Advances orders for baby chicks for early delivery in 1943 now constitute a record in the Province and preparations have been made by hatcherymen, breeder flock owners, registered station operators, and others, to handle the anticipated increased volume for 1943.

Railroads Face Greater Demand

MONTREAL, Dec. 30 (CP)—Railroads in Canada face greater demands upon their equipment and services now than they had ever before experienced, D. C. Coleman, President of Canadian Pacific Railway Company, said today in a review of transportation problems.

The past 12 months had been fraught with serious difficulties of operation and direction such as were found to follow upon unprecedented traffic volume, together with market shortages of material and labor, Mr. Coleman said.

Proposes New Hours For Liquor Store

HALIFAX, Dec. 30 (CP)—The Halifax transit committee has proposed to J.H. MacQuarrie, Nova Scotia Attorney General, that hours of sale in liquor commission stores in Halifax be changed to from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. At present, the commission stores are open from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m.

The committee proposal said that the present hours contribute to overcrowding of transportation facilities during rush hours. It also pointed out what it called "dis-graceful" conditions, with crowds queuing up in front of commission stores throughout the city.

The committee stated that the present hours also caused a loss of manpower and there was increasing evidence of bootlegging at ex-orbitant prices during the evening hours. Regarding manpower, the committee said many persons went to the stores during their non-hour, but could not be served until as late as 3.30 or 4 p.m., and consequently many took the rest of the afternoon off.

Rain Bogs Fighting

LONDON, Dec. 30 (CP)—Activities of both sides of the conflict in the Russian front were bogged down again today by continuous rains and appalling mud conditions which made movement of guns and vehicles all but impossible.
