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Business Men Favor Old Home Week For S' side

A fairly representative gathering of the business men of the town of Summerside met last night with Mr. J. F. Arnett in the chair to discuss the idea of holding an "Old Home Week" or carnival next summer. Much discussion took place as to the benefits to be derived from such a celebration and the consensus of opinion was that it would be a good advertising medium for the town.

In his opening remarks, Mr. Arnett said that it was 32 years since Summerside had held a real home week and that there had been a good many improvements and changes since that time.

Mr. M. P. Titus was then called upon and explained how a celebration of a like nature had been successfully put on in Charlottetown, which prizes were given. To put such a thing over successfully the committee responsible must have foresight and be prepared to put a good deal of time into it. Meetings should be held every two weeks from now to January and from then on every week. The wholehearted support of the entire town must be behind the celebration. Financial aid to operation and preparation is absolutely essential for a successful conclusion of the idea. From the largest business concern down to the smallest boy of the town, each and everyone must do their part to make it all. Many methods could be adopted to provide funds. Each organization could suggest their own way of contributing to the expenses of the undertaking. Any profits could be donated to charitable institutions. Mr. Titus concluded by saying that Charlottetown came out on top and considered it well worth while.

Speaking on the motion, Mr. Arnett stressed two things: The 100 per cent co-operation of the citizens and the tremendous benefits to the town of such events. Mayor Robinson cited Vancouver and Sydney, who had gained considerable publicity from celebrations of this kind, and considered that Summerside was well able to stage such a thing, now it could boast an airport, yacht club and other things usually found in an up-to-date town.

Senator MacArthur stressed the benefit directly and indirectly that an affair of this kind would mean to the town. A very important thing was to have the right kind of people, who would encourage tourists to come. A good program was essential. The date was important and should not conflict with hay or harvest. The Senator made the suggestion that the week before the Charlottetown fair would be the best time. Summerside is recognized by the Financial Post and other leading papers as the most progressive and up-to-date town in the Dominion, which was something to be proud of.

Mr. W. E. MacDonald, Mr. A. R. Brennan, Mr. Reginald Pope and others spoke on the matter.

At the conclusion of the meeting a committee consisting of Mayor Robinson, Senator MacArthur, J. F. Arnett, M. P. Titus and A. R. Brennan were appointed to find out whether the majority of the business people and citizens were in favor of the idea and would report to a meeting to be held later. The meeting adjourned.—S.

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Summerside Lads Missing, But Believed Safe

Search parties were out in Summerside harbour until nearly midnight last night looking for three young lads, all under 14, who had gone out in a dory early in the afternoon. As they did not return for supper their parents became anxious and search parties went out to look for them. Two motor boats and several row boats aided in the search. Herman Durant and others who had crossed to Bedque after some searching, found the dory afloat and dry pulled up on the shore about opposite to Holman's Island.

Enquiries at several farm houses failed to locate the boys, but it is thought that they must be safe, sleeping in a hay loft or at a farm house, as the dory was too heavy for the lads to pull up without help. The boys are Raymond Durant, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Durant, Malcolm McCormick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard McCormick, and Percy Martin, son of Mrs. Martin and the late Joseph Martin, all of Summerside. The heavy gale blowing all day increased the anxiety of the parents until the boat was found.—S.

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
