A GRAND ENTERTAINMENT

On the evening of April 30, the people of Tignish assembled in the Tignish Hall to enjoy an entertainment, never before equalled in this place. The show was presented by our local talent who certainly did their parts admirably.

Owing to the inclemency of the weather and the bad condition of the roads, the audience was not as large as it otherwise would have been, and it is regrettable that such an excellent programme could not have been witnessed by all the people of the community. A well staged minstrel show makes as pleasant an entertainment as is possible to see and the participants in this case, though but amateurs acted their parts to perfection. Wit and humor were exhibited during the whole performance and local hits thought not of an order to cause any illfeelings among the citizens, manifested the peculiarities which exist amongst the people, in a manner which convulsed the audience into fits of laughter.

One particularly striking feature of the show was the costumes which looked quite in keeping with its nature and which showed remarkable good taste on the part of those who suggested such apparel. The musical part of the programme was exceptionally well rendered by several solo and choruses being sung by our most noted vocalists.

Nor can we allow the occasion to pass without making mention also of Mrs. Morriss, who has been not only a very pleasant acquaintance, but who has always evinced considerable interest in all social functions and who was always and ever ready to lend a helping hand towards their inauguration and perfection.

Now that you are about to leave us we bid you farewell, but bear in mind that your noble character and many principles which you have always exhibited shall ever remain green in the memory of the citizens of Tignish.

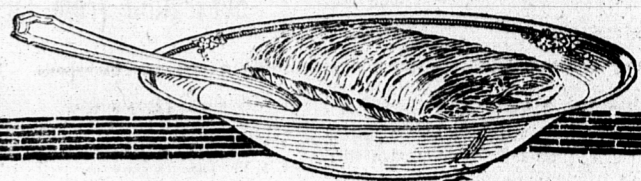

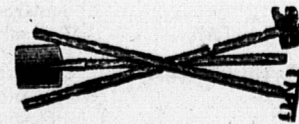

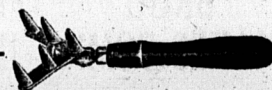
