Brief was their earthly visit. Symbol of hope and love. Ere the kind Father recalled them Back to his home above.

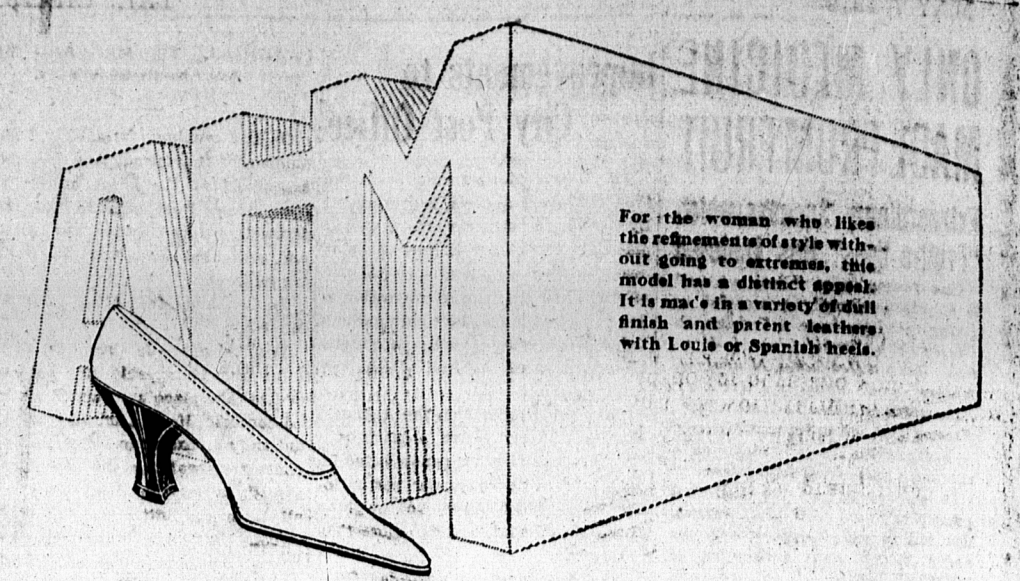
SOLDIERS AS TEACHERS. The Minister of Education in Saskatchewan is encouraging returned soldiers to become teachers.

WAR TIME BLACK LISTS ARE ALL SUSPENDED.

OTTAWA, April 29.—A cablegram to the Canadian Trade Commission from the Canadian Mission in London conveys the important information for exporters that all war time black lists have been suspended. These lists contained the names of several thousand merchants all over the globe who had intimate relations with either enemy governments or traders of enemy nationalities. There was an especially long list in Spain and in South America.

The net national debt is about \$1,500,000,000. The Canadian Trade Commission seeks to awaken a realization of this fact in every man and woman in the Dominion.
