**COLLISION CASE.**—In the suit of the schooner Sarah A. Townsend against the Black Diamond Line steamer Cacoon, as the result of the collision that occurred between these vessels on Wednesday morning last off Cape Tormentine, the Vice-Admiralty Court has been applied to and a warrant and summons have been issued, but have not yet been served.
