CHARLOTTETOWN EXHIBITION HORSE RACES.—There were altogether 8 classes of horse races advertised to take place during exhibition week. PROMOTION MERITED.—The cablegram from the Gazette's resident staff correspondent in London last night, stating that Sergt. Walter H. Gordon and Sergt Bert Sargent, C. F. A., had won their commissions in the field, will be read with pleasure by the many friends of these two young Montreal Officers. Lieut. Gordon, who is a brother of Dr. A. H. Gordon, and the son of Rev. Dr. J. A. Gordon, former pastor of the First Baptist Church and now Professor in the Baptist College at Brandon, was an arts graduate at McGill 1909. Immediately after leaving the university he took up newspaper work, and was successively sporting editor of the Gazette and city editor of the Journal of Commerce, resigning the latter post to enlist as a gunner in the 21st Battery, soon after the outbreak of the war. Lieut. Sargent graduated in science at McGill in 1911 and was for a time connected with the firm of Darling Brothers, Ltd., engineers and manufacturers, while he also spent a short time in the United States. He was prominent in amateur sport at McGill and after his graduation, and is a brother of Grover Sargent, the star hockeyist. Lieuts. Gordon and Sargent were classmates at Grande Ligne, continued their intimacy through and following their college courses, joined the McGill C. O. T. C. immediately upon the outbreak of the war, enlisted in the same battery as gunners, gained their corporal's stripes before leaving Montreal, crossed to France with a draft, Sergeant last year, and now obtain their lieutenantcies at the same time. The only break in their association since enlisting was when Sergeant Sargent crossed to France, with a draft, Sergeant Gordon being retained in England for some months as an instructor. The latter has been at the front since January last.—The Gazette, Montreal. (Lieut. Gordon is a brother of Mr. J. P. Gordon, of Charlottetown.)
