JUNILE CRIME.

There was a sad object lesson at the Police Court yesterday morning when two boys, both under ten years of age, were placed in the dock charged with serious crime. They had been found by a policeman at two o'clock in premises into which they had broken and unlawfully entered, and taken to the station. In the dock they confessed to having broken the window of Mr. R. B. Norton's premises, some weeks ago, and more recently having broken into, entered and stolen more or less money from the shops of Messrs. Blake Brothers, Saunders & Newcome, and Sanderson & Co. It was pitiful to see boys of such tender years thus placed in the criminal's dock. It is doubly pitiful that so many other boys and girls in Charlottetown are also daily and nightly exposed to the bad influences of the street which are guiding them inevitably to lives of shame and disgrace.

There must be sad neglect of parental care when boys so young and small are permitted to be absent from their homes and beds unaccounted for at such an hour and on such a night as that of Thursday last. What parent with any sense of duty or responsibility could permit such absence? And yet how many children of both sexes and of tender years are permitted to loiter on the streets, or about the lanes and alleys during all hours of the night. The Curfew Law was designed to prevent this open night school of vice and crime, and would have done much to prevent it had it been enforced. But here lax administration is at fault, just as parental neglect was at fault in the first instance. Shall these joint agencies for evil be continued or will our citizens unite in energetic and steadfast effort to bring about a better order of things?

The matter is one that calls trumpet-tongued to the pulpit and the press, to all the agencies and forces that make for the preservation of the youth of our streets from the vice and crime which will surely claim them as things are going. We need a compulsory education law and a truant law, that these children may be brought within the educative and uplifting agency of the schools. Do we not need a reformatory also? These boys who confessed to their lawlessness in the Police Court yesterday must be detained in jail for months until they can be tried at the Supreme Court, and then, if the law is carried out they must be sentenced to prison to keep company in the months or years to come with hardened criminals. Is this the way to bring them back to virtuous and useful lives?

We must not be too severe upon these little boys who were caught in the act and by their own confession are violators of the laws. It may be that many other and good boys, whose lives are full of promise and hope, had they been exposed to the same neglect and vicious surroundings would have also turned out badly. Many a good citizen, honored and revered among his fellows might have been dragged down to vice and shame, had he in his early days been surrounded only by the influences and examples that make for evil. Nor are we as citizens free from responsibility until we take all possible and practicable means to secure the boys and girls of Charlottetown from the neglect, the base examples and the lawless privileges which are leading them inevitably to the criminal dock. There is a great work of prevention, of education and of rescue yet to be done in this city and it is high time it was undertaken anew with a will and by regularly organized effort.
