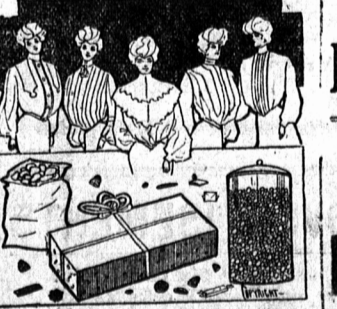

He dined the other day with the Canadian eight, and he adds that a finer lot of students he has never met. The American boys have also sent over a first rate lot of men, and they have all settled down to the Oxford ways. The authorities, the Doctor adds, are greatly impressed with the newcomers, especially when they took seven out of the nine prizes for athletic events.

LONDON'S GREAT FOG

(London Mail.) There was one man in Birmingham who was profoundly grateful for yesterday's fog. It was Sir Oliver Lodge, to whom the visitation presented a fresh opportunity to renew the steady war, which he commenced twenty years ago against the fog fiend.

Standing in a secluded courtyard of Birmingham University, his deerstalker cap and long brown overcoat beaded with moisture, Sir Oliver was to be seen absorbed in the contemplation of mysterious strands of barbed wire, which vanished a few feet above in impenetrable vapors.

From his research laboratory came the vicious crackle of a powerful electric discharge, and great jagged sparks vibrated between the spherical terminals of the apparatus with which his assistants were preparing to launch the tentative thunderbolts of science against the British climate.

Men pulled the terminals apart, and as the discharge was transferred to the outside wires there proceeded from the hundreds of invisible harbs overhead a hissing noise, like the sound of rain drops on a hot plate.

Then a wonderful thing happened. Through the opaque fog bank the outlines of the tall university buildings were gradually developed, with the slow certainty of a photographic plate. The fog became a cloud and the cloud a mist, disappearing itself in dark drops about the walls, writhing and squirming as though racked by the violence of the discharge.

Away up in the eaves, eighty feet high, there was visible the elaborate insulators in which the arched wires terminated.

Then the current was shut off, the noise ceased, and the acid white fog crept back and enveloped the court yard once more. When it was suggested that a score of installations similar to this would afford practical relief to the fog bound city, Sir Oliver said: "All that I can do is to erect this model apparatus for the benefit of engineers who are interested in such a project."

MEN MET AND FOUGHT AS BEASTS

The following is a graphic account of one of the features in the capture of Port Arthur. It throws a lurid sidelight on the awful slaughter during the past months.

The second night of the occupation a Japanese lieutenant, by name Oda, asked for a volunteer party, called "keisshaitai," an expression which in English would mean "certain death."

Thirty keisshaitai men came forward. Oda put himself at their head and ventured along the bed of the moat toward the rear-most caponiere, with the idea of capturing it.

The moat is very long (about one and a half times the length of an ocean liner) so there was room and time for adventure in the darkness, for there was no moon, and the searchlights were playing on other parts of the field, this being too close under the nose of the Russians for them to operate their lights to advantage.

Half way down the moat Oda met a Russian lieutenant and a party, bent on a similar errand. There the two had it out, not with bullets in the prescribed way, but bayonet to bayonet, fist to fist, and even teeth and claw.

The two lieutenants grappled, neither having time to draw sword.

Oda and the Russian locked embraces, reeled back and forth, falling, rising, clawing, first one on top and then the other, each losing sight and control of his men, all of whom were engaged in similar individual combats.

The two leaders, grasping for an opportunity that each sought, bobbing against the walls of the moat, fighting in this arena, tight for combat, soon to be a neopolis, reached, without knowing it, an embassage which led to the rear of the fort and into the gorge.

Tripping over this, not knowing where they were going, the two plunged head-long down the slope, above which frowned two Russian batteries, and beyond which rose the great red-capped skyline of the Cockscomb.

More than 300 feet, scratched by the stones, smashed by the shale, they slipped and writhed, until they struck a tiny plateau half way down the mountain. On this they lodged.

In the fall Oda had been able to get his right arm free. He reached over across his enemy's back and grasped the hilt of his keen, straight, ancestral sword. Pulling it half way out of the scabbard, which was tightly lashed to his waist, he sawed and puffed until the slender, tapering steel had gashed through the Russian's clothes, through thigh and bone, full to his vertebrae.

Late the following night, after the sun had gone, Oda crawled into his own trenches at the base of the mountain. His men had been repulsed by a second party of Russians who had sortied out to relieve the first. Still, the Japanese held their two caponieres at front and the Russians the two at the rear.
