THAT FALSE TELEGRAM

The Facts as Declared by Hansard the Official Record of Parliament.

After Mr. Meighen's statement here regarding the bogus telegram that canari was dropped for a while but now revived again—the matter was ventilated in Parliament and the official report can be appealed to as the very best authority—we invite our readers to study the case.

On Sept. 24, 1919 (see Hansard page 556) Mr. D. D. McKenzie, (Cape Breton North and Victoria) moved:—

Whereas the following telegram was despatched in code from Winnipeg by the Honorable Arthur Meighen one of the Ministers of the crown to the Right Honorable Sir Robert L. Borden, Prime Minister of Canada, on or about the 30th November 1917:—

CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAYS TELEGRAPH

Winnipeg, Nov. 30th, 1917.

Sir Robert L. Borden,

Ottawa Ont.

(Here follows the code words)

Charge Union Government Committee.

Arthur Meighen.

And whereas the said telegram when deciphered read as follows:—

Canadian Pacific Railway Companies Telegraph

Winnipeg November 30 1917

Sir Robert L. Borden

Ottawa Ont.

Would the one thousand redoubt vote at large for Manitoba, of which 300 for Selkirk, balance divided between Provencher, MacDonald and Springfield of same proportion of division no matter what allotment may be

ARTHUR MEIGHEN

The above contains the alleged telegram then followed the balance of the resolution and speech which space will not permit to reproduce—But it is all found in the alleged telegram—

Mr. Mackenzie did not produce the original of the alleged telegram when moving his resolution, so Mr. Meighen could not tell whether he wrote it or not. He is reported in Hansard page 556, same date, as stating:—

"I have no recollection of the telegram whatever. The message might have been sent; it might have been sent by me; it is a message that might have been sent by any honest man" etc.

Mr. MacMaster followed in a speech on the following and repeated the charge that Mr. Meighen sent that telegram and that he could prove it. See Hansard page 579

We refer to Mr. MacMaster's statement only to show he was in the hot to the hilt.

Observe the situation. Mr. Meighen was charged with writing a certain telegram and a supposed copy of it read and put on the records of Parliament but the mover would not let Mr. Meighen see the original as it was withheld.

On Oct. 2, 1919, on page 818 of Hansard Mr. McKenzie is reported as follows:—

"A great deal of fault has been found with me because I did not have the telegram. Here is the original draft of the telegram"

Mr. Meighen: Will the honorable gentleman be good enough to send it to me that I may see it?

Mr. McKenzie: I have no hesitation—I do not know whose writing it is. It is the original draft—The Code is there with it.

Mr. Meighen: The telegram is not in my writing, is not signed by me, the initials are not mine—Were never made by me—Not a word of it was written by me.

Mr. McKenzie: The minister in his speech the other day said that if the Committee sent out the telegram he is not going to go back on them. He accepts it—whether he wrote it or not it came from his office and he is the father of it.

The claim is that it came from Mr. Meighen's office, in short he admits it was taken from his office. Of course if it came from there it was stolen—we will close this part of the narrative by quoting Mr. Meighen's reply:—

Mr. Meighen: The honorable gentleman has endeavored to build up a case on the supposition that I sent the telegram. I did not send it—I never saw it—it is not in my writing—The initials were not made by me. It never came to my attention and the honorable gentleman if he does not know that, might have known it, and I think has known it all along.

After the vote was taken the Minister of Justice demanded that the alleged telegram be tabled but Mr. McKenzie refused. Why did he refuse to have it tabled? Because the evidence of his crookedness was too strong.

On page 551 of Hansard will be seen Mr. McKenzie's admission that the alleged telegram was not addressed to any one nor signed by any one although he presented it to parliament in his first speech addressed in full to Sir Robert Borden and signed in full by Mr. Meighen. Thus the plot was laid bare.

It was gotten up for campaign purposes and so little regard has Messrs. Sinclair and D. A. McKinnon for truth that this bogus telegram is trotted out with airs of horror, at Mr. Meighen's wickedness.

It is fortunate that we have a reliable record like Hansard to expose such political crookedness. If Mr. Sinclair and his colleague in 1917 had taken the course that was their duty to have taken to send supports to the men on the firing line they would have received their share of their votes. And when the irritations incidental to the war will have passed away Messrs. Sinclair, Hughes and their colleagues will find their record to be that of men who played an unworthy part. They broke faith with those who Sleep in Flanders Fields.

The Progressive Party, led by Hon. T. A. Crerar, seeks support on a platform which calls for Free Trade.

There should be little or no doubt that the majority of the people of Canada believe in a policy of reasonable Tariff Protection. The great danger is that past party affiliations may lead some to vote for King candidates not fully realizing what the consequences may be.

To these electors we now suggest they study the situation carefully before voting. If they do so they will learn that if the election results in a King-Crerar or a Crerar-King alliance, Canada's Protective Tariff is doomed.

Crerar as leader of the Progressive movement, is determined to pursue his Free Trade course, and his Western supporters will never let him depart from it.

King has so trimmed his sails that he can join any group. Party principles with him are secondary to his strong desire to attain office. His many speeches have indicated most clearly that his chief aim is to secure the reins of government and he stands prepared to sacrifice the Tariff or anything else to secure that end.
