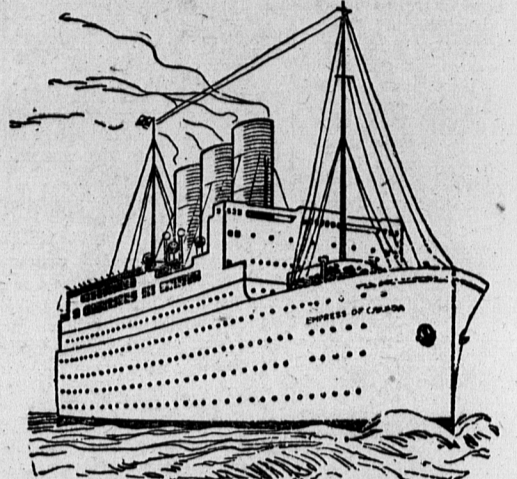

Remembering all these kindnesses, a heartfelt thank you rises to our lips. Yes, we thank you in the name of all those present, and we will keep a good souvenir of you, we trust you will not be unmindful of us, especially we ask you to remember us in your good prayers. We would like to give the lie to the proverb that says, "Out of sight, out of mind." Whilst we regret your leaving us, we realize that you have chosen the better part in going to be a religious, that is why we congratulate you with all our hearts. We wish you every happiness in your new life and let us hope that some day you will return to Miscouche bearing a pretty name and garbed in the costume of the congregation of Notre Dame. Permit us, dear friend, to offer you as a token of esteem and as souvenirs these modest presents that will remind you of us. Once more, accept our thanks, our congratulations, our wishes in this last re-union before your departure and promise us to take with you not in a corner of your valise, but in a corner of your heart, the souvenir of your faithful friends of the parish of Miscouche.
