Premier Rescued From Frenzied Mob

Germany Makes No Provision For War Reparations

Government Going Ahead With Its Financing Plans On The Theory That There Will Be No More Payments.

ELECTION SUNDAY IN GERMANY

Hitler Continues Whirlwind Campaign — 200,000 Cheer Socialist Leader In Course Of His Drive.

KOENIGSBERG, Germany, April 5—Enthusiastic crowds aggregating 200,000 cheered Adolf Hitler, National Socialist leader, during an aeroplane tour today in which he visited Lauenburg, Danzig, Elbing and Koensberg in the course of his campaign for the Presidential election Sunday.

Agricultural Lauenburg proclaimed a half holiday and thousands of farmers from the surrounding district swarmed into an empty factory to hear the Nazi candidate speak.

At Langfuhr flying field in Danzig 35,000 persons assembled. Hitler reviewed the local Nazi storm troops, who were in full uniform and stood at stiff attention as he passed by.

When Hitler was told of the publication today of National Socialist documents seized by Prussian officials in raids last month, he shrugged his shoulders and said: "Bah! Piffle!"

REDUCTION IN TRAIN SERVICE IS ANNOUNCED

Double Service Between Moncton, Charlottetown And Summerside Will Be Resumed May 1st.

MONCTON, N. B., April 5.—According to announcement by the Canadian National Railways the continued falling off in passenger traffic resulting in part from general trade conditions, but due also in a marked degree to the much greater use of highways, makes it necessary to reduce passenger train service on Prince Edward Island effective May 1st, next, as follows:
The double train service between Moncton, Charlottetown and Summerside daily except Sunday will be resumed and usual adjustments will be made in the service between Charlottetown, Summerside and Tignish to meet this service. Con-

MUCH INTEREST IN HONOLULU MURDER TRIAL

Selection Of Jury Impeded Yesterday When Prospective Jurors State That Defendants Should Be Shot.

HONOLULU, April 5—Strong fixed opinions of prospective jurors, one of whom expressed the belief the defendants "ought to be shot," impeded selection of a jury today to try Mrs. Granville Fortescue and three navy men, accused of lynching Joseph Kahahawai, a native.

When the second day of the trial of Mrs. Fortescue, Lieut. Thomas H. Massee, her son-in-law, and two enlisted men ended, six Anglo Saxons, three Chinese, one Japanese, one Hawaiian and one Portuguese had been temporarily accepted for service.

JAPS INCREASE MILITARY STRENGTH

About 50,000 Troops Now Quartered In Manchuria.

TOKYO, April 5—(A.P.)—Japan's military strength in Manchuria and Korea was ordered reinforced by the equivalent of one division today to bring her total strength on the northeastern Asiatic continent about 50,000 troops.

AUSTRALIA SENDS NOTE TO DE VALERA

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 5—The New York Times today publishes the following special cable from Canberra: "The Australian Government has sent a note to the De Valera Government of Ireland urging it not to take any action which would weaken the Free State's ties with the British Empire. The note says that Australia is proud to number among her citizens a large proportion of people of Irish birth, who might be vitally affected by any constitutional change involving their rights and privileges as citizens of a member of the British Commonwealth of Nations."

LONDON, April 5—Montagu Norman today was re-elected governor of the Bank of England and Sir Ernest Musgrave Harvey was named deputy governor.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 5—(By the Canadian Press)
—Prime Minister Sir Richard Squires was rescued tonight from the House of Assembly, where he had been besieged for several hours during and after the resignation of his Government, and was taken to a private residence nearby. The volunteer party which effected his removal was led by Rev. W. A. Godfrey, Rev. C. Johnson and Rev. Father Pippy.

The crowd, which had stormed the Assembly, smashed windows, ransacked files and strewed government documents in the street, after delay in admitting a deputation to the legislature, recognized the Premier and demanded that he be turned over to them. They threatened to throw him in the harbor.

The best influence of the clergymen was used to induce their dispersal. Shortly after eight o'clock, however, crowds were still congregated in the Government grounds, with beleaguered policemen still inside the building. Two constables and two injured civilians were taken to hospital.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 5—Early tonight the Newfoundland Government resigned. Prime Minister Sir Richard Squires and detachments of police were sheltering in the House of Assembly, while a mob waited at its doors.

Several police were injured by stones, and various persons by po-

River Conditions In New Brunswick Less Dangerous
