synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section on alongside his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. Monday, November 11th. Pte Riley spent over two years in this hospital after returning from the front with shell wound in his spine. He enlisted in the 55th Battalion and left Sussex in May, 1915. After being in France for some time he was slightly wounded but was enabled to return to duty again, in a short time. A couple months later he was wounded in the spine, and was sent to England to undergo treatment. From there he was sent to Summerside Hospital, where he had been ever since. Pte. Riley was of a cheerful disposition, never complaining, but bearing his sufferings with Christian fortitude. He leaves to mourn his father, Mr. Joseph Riley, of Wilmot, one sister, Mrs. Quigley, of Freetown, and one brother John in his country's service.
