UNITED STATES SECRET SERVICE COSTS OVER \$7,000,000 EACH YEAR. (Rochester Herald.)

The annual Provincial S. S. Convention opened in the Pres-byterian Church at Summerside, yesterday morning. The attendance this year was much better than last year there being over 100 delegates in attendance. The convention opened with devotional services led by W. Warron. After the opening exercises a new field secretary, Rev. W. A. Ross delivered an excellent address on the elementary age of child study in which he emphasized the training to reverence God of children from their earliest years in order that a sure foundation will be laid for a future work. The elementary teacher must use object lessons as in this way the truth can be more easily impressed upon the child. After Mr. Ross's address the morning session closed with the benediction by Rev. M. W. Field. The afternoon session opened at 2.15 with devotions led by E. S. Weeks. The first work of this session was the naming of committees as follows: E. S. Weeks, R. G. Strathie, W. M. Field, committee on Resolutions; Revs. C. A. Westmorland, F. A. Wightman and H. W. Toombs. Credentials committee—Rev. H. Johnson, Mrs. Stearns and M. Hicks.

The next work was calling the roll and the presidents and the following districts were found represented: Central King's, Georgetown, Souris, Tyne Valley, O'Leary, Kensington, S. E. Prince and N. W. Queen's. The next on the program was on the international age, which age Mr. Ross claims is between 12 and 16, for between these years the child is very susceptible to the word of God. This then is the golden harvest and all teachers should set an example, for at this age the children are the greatest critics. Mr. Ross's address was followed by an address by the Rev. F. A. Wightman on training and supplementary lessons. In his address Mr. Wightman said that the best time for teaching supplementary lessons is at the opening of the regular class work. This department, he said, is adopted to country schools especially and is used principally for the memorizing of scripture. Next followed a conference on teacher training led by Rev. W. A. Brown, during which some interesting instruction was given to the delegates. The afternoon session closed with singing and the benediction by Rev. M. W. Field. The evening session opened at 8 p. m. The President in the chair. After devotional exercises Rev. R. G. Strathie read an address of welcome to the delegates which was replied to by His Honor Lieut. Governor Rogers. Then followed the annual address of the President Rev. E. E. Styles, Pownal. After the President's address was disposed of an excellent address was given by the International Sunday School worker Mr. Brown, after which the meeting closed with benediction.

GIVEN UP AS DEAD, HE CLAIMS ESTATE. WINDSOR, Ont., Oct. 17—Two years ago Frederick H. Steers, who resided with his wife in a comfortable home on Caron Avenue, this city, took a sudden dislike for all things domestic; and disappeared, leaving no word behind. Mrs. Steers gave up her husband for dead. Seven months ago Mrs. Steers was taken suddenly ill, and when on her deathbed made a will bequeathing all her possessions, consisting of \$5,000 worth of real estate, to a friend, David Clark of Sandwich. Recently news of his wife's death reached Steers out in Colorado, where he had been living since leaving home, and he hastened back to Windsor to secure her property. Today he discovered that he had been cut off without anything, and immediately began proceedings to have his wife's will set aside.

STRIKE IN PARIS IS ENDED. PARIS, October 17.—The railroad strike was formally called off tonight. This was decided at a meeting of the strike committee of the national railroads' union. Work will be resumed on all lines tomorrow. The French railroad strike has now failed. The credit of this victory is due to Prime Minister Briand, who saw at the outset that the real object of the general federation of labor was, by means of a general strike, to get complete possession of the executive power and establish a government closely resembling that of the commune of 1871.

This crisis, perhaps the most dangerous which the third republic has experienced in its history, is now over. The imprisoned leaders are dismayed to find that the implicit orders for a general strike given to all the trade unions in France were not obeyed. No doubt acts of violence by which a few red hot anarchists vent their rage, will continue, but the backbone of the revolution is broken. M. Briand has the firm support of an overwhelming majority of the nation in his energetic measures, such as bringing the railway employes under martial law, by which he succeeded in saving the third republic from shipwreck.

PORTLAND, Me., Oct. 12—Dressed in new clothes from head to foot, and carrying two dress suit cases packed with sweaters and haberdashery, all of which had been stolen from a local clothing store, two boys named David W. Dudley and James E. Mahan, of Chelsea, were arrested as they were taking the boat for Boston.

ADDITIONAL FACTS OF FLIGHT. NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—The steamship Trent, via United Wireless, at 4.30 a. m. Tuesday sighted the airship America and wireless communication was immediately established. The operator of the airship, informed the operator on the Trent that the airship's crew wished to abandon the balloon. Wireless communication was kept up from this time on between the airship and the steamer. Daylight was approaching and the Trent followed the America, which was drifting at the rate of twelve miles. It was decided that the best means of rescue was to launch the airship's lifeboat. This was a hazardous undertaking, as the trailer of the airship threatened to ensnare the lifeboat into the water. The danger was at last overcome and the operation carried out with success. The airship immediately on being relieved of its weight of crew and boat, shot skyward. After some difficulty the crew were taken on board, together with the lifeboat at 7.30 a. m.
