OTTAWA, June 9—(CP)—The House of Commons tonight gave its approval to the \$2,000,000,000 war appropriation bill, which has been under discussion since April 20. The bill was given second reading by the House last night and is expected to pass without discussion on the morning of the 10th. The bill provides for the raising of 15,000 men for military training in July, it was learned today.

### Red Troops Continue To Throw Off Heavy Attacks; Civilians Carry On.

MOSCOW, June 10—(Wednesday)—(AP)—Soviet defenders of Sevastopol killed 2,500 Germans yesterday in savage hand-to-hand fighting as the Nazis hurled wave upon wave of infantrymen at the approaches of the Black Sea naval base, the Russians announced early today.

Magnuson (Dem-Wash.) said today the United States is in danger of losing Alaska unless a western road is built.

### Drew's Criticism Raises Discussion

OTTAWA, June 9—(CP)—Justice Minister St. Laurent told the House of Commons today he has asked departmental officials to obtain, if possible, the complete statement made by Lt. Col. George Drew, Ontario Conservative leader, on the Hong Kong inquiry.

OTTAWA, June 9—(CP)—Duty and war exchange tax on coke imports from the United States have been removed, J. McG. Stewart, coal administrator for the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, announced tonight.  
OTTAWA, June 9—(CP)—Hon. P. J. A. Gardin, former Transport Minister, said tonight it had not yet been decided whether French-Canadian members of the House of Commons will introduce an amendment to the government's bill to send the National Resources Mobilization Act.  
LONDON, June 9—(CP)—Prime Minister Churchill announced tonight the establishment of a combined production and resources board and a combined food board for "most effective use of the combined resources of the United States and the United Kingdom for prosecution of the war."  
HONGKONG, June 9—(AP)—Chinese forces still in possession of the walled town of Chushien have killed or wounded 7,000 Japanese in three days, raising enemy casualties to more than 18,000 in furious but thus far futile assaults upon the key rail town in western Chekiang Province, the Chinese command announced tonight.
