Shipping News

ANOTHER TOW ON WAY TO HALIFAX.

Reports were received in Halifax Wednesday evening that the United States Shipping Board steamer, Nesco, 2256 tons, was being towed to Halifax by the Western Comet, at noon Wednesday given as 300 miles east of Cape Race. It is thought that boiler troubles has developed on board the Nesco; but that has not yet been confirmed. The tow is proceeding at the rate of two knots an hour. The Nesco was at Norfolk, Virginia on March 6.

The Western Comet, which will be recalled as in for a great deal of prominence during the Powhatan episode, left Le Havre for New York on March 3 and it is believed that she was making her return passage to Le Havre when summoned to the rescue of the Nesco. She is a vessel of 3578 tons. According to the last reports the tow was proceeding satisfactorily although very slowly.

U. S. STEAMER SUNK IN COLLISION OFF USHANT.

A wireless despatch received in London states the American steamer Rock Island Bridge has been in collision with an unknown steamer off Ushant, North-western France, and is sinking fast. The steamer Bakersfield is proceeding to the scene of the accident.

The steamship Rock Island Bridge, 3,174 tons, sailed from Portland, Maine, on February 20th, for Antwerp, where she arrived March 5th. From Antwerp she was to go to Rotterdam, and it is probable she was on her return trip to the United States when the collision occurred.

CUNARDER SAXONIA ENROUTE TO HALIFAX.

The Cunard liner Saxonia has left London for Halifax and is expected to arrive there the first of next week. Yesterday the Robert Redford Company received word that the steamer sailed from London on Saturday afternoon for Halifax and New York. To disembark at Halifax she has 277 second and 376 third-class passengers.

The Saxonia, which has made numerous trips to Halifax since 1914, recently had the distinction of opening the Cunard Line service to Hamburg, going on to the German port after touching at London.

THE ABERDEEN REPLACES BUOYS.

A message to J. C. Chesley, Marine Department Agent St. John, from the captain of the Government steamer Aberdeen, reports the replacing of Blonde Rock buoy, Peas Island buoy and others in the vicinity of Cape Sable, which had been torn away in the recent storm. He also reported yesterday afternoon a mast with rigging attached partly submerged off Cape Sable. He planned to try to secure it on his return trip.

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HINTS FOR The Motorist

FUEL FEED: THE PLAIN GRAVITY SYSTEM

The accompanying diagram illustrates in principle the simplest method of supplying gasoline from the supply tank to the carburetor, namely, by utilizing the principle that a liquid tends to flow from a higher to a lower level. Here A is a cross section of the supply tank which is usually a steel cylinder of seamless construction, located under the front seat board or just to the rear of the front seat back but which may be of more or less rectangular section, as located in the cowl space, just behind the engine. C is the carburetor which is supplied from tank A and the point L indicates the level in the carburetor float chamber at which gasoline must be maintained in order to secure proper carburetor action. B is the soft copper fuel-pipe which conducts gasoline from the tank to the carburetor, connecting at one end to a fitting in the bottom of the tank and at the other to a ground union at the entrance to the carburetor bowl. D is a valve by means of which the fuel supply to the carburetor may be cut off. A break is here shown in pipe B to indicate that the tank may be at



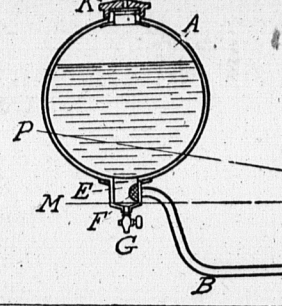
varying distances from the carburetor in the case of cars of differing lengths or having their tanks in different locations. The fuel pipe is usually led down from the tank and secured to the frame member by means of special metal clips, so that it shall not rub against parts of the chassis and be cut through or break under constant bending and usually a coil or "pigtail" is formed in it to give flexibility between the carburetor and the point at which it leaves its supports up on the frame. The valve D may be either close to the carburetor or close to the tank, for the sake of accessibility. The fitting E at the bottom of the tank forms a settling pocket, in which water and heavy solid particles collect and as a portion of this pocket is below the point of attachment of fuel pipe B such foreign matters collect there and can be drawn off through drain cock G and thus prevented from entering the carburetor, which it might obstruct. F is a fine-meshed metal gauze screen placed over the mouth of pipe B to prevent the lighter solid particles from passing through. This settling pocket may, instead be located as a separate unit at any convenient point in pipe B and there may be an additional screen or filter in the union by which the fuel pipe is connected to the carburetor, or elsewhere in the fuel line, which permits the carburetor bowl to be emptied of gasoline and any impurities which may have escaped past E and F. In the upper surface of the tank is a large filling opening, closed by the screw cap K through which there must be a small opening to the outside air, as otherwise, as gasoline was drawn from the tank a vacuum would tend to form above the surface of the liquid, further outflow would be prevented and the carburetor supply would be stopped. This is the simplest method of fuel feed conceivable, as the flow of gasoline depends upon the action of the unbalancing action of gravity and so long as the level of fuel in the tank is higher than the required level of fuel in the carburetor float chamber, fuel supply is assured. However, it is difficult to maintain the above condition uninterrupted. LM is a horizontal line drawn from the carburetor through the
