WOMEN OF NEW FRANCE HAD EYE FOR FASHION
MONTREAL, Aug. 19 - (CP) - "The women of New France three centuries ago were as chic as their modern counterparts of Montreal, and even in these days fashion was important.
"Then the women were not just cooks, housekeepers, courtesans or princesses," said Roger L. Regor, professor of costume history at the Central School of Arts and Crafts. "A great lady of this period was Madame de la Lande who negotiated an exchange of prisoners between Count Frontenac and Sir William Phips when Quebec was attacked in 1690. She wore an attractive dress, similar to the type fashionable in France a year or two earlier. Each new ship from France brought back from Paris new dresses, fabrics, millinery and accessories which were copied and worn at the court of the Governor."
Prof. Regor has designed historical costume dresses worn by waitresses in several hotels in the Laurentians.
