materially aid in strengthening muscle, expanding lung, and enlarging natural initiative, leadership and self-control, thereby fitting the rising generation for the stern duties of life. As a means of relaxation from the ordinary school routine as well as a medium for the development of sound, robust bodies such physical drills can be safely recommended. In this day when the preservation of a life to the state means so much because of its material and economic value, surely every effort is worth while which has for its object not only the stamping out of existing preventable disease, but also so invigorating the body that it is the better fitted for the activities of life.

The spread of disease is made easy in our public schools, where pupils daily meet together. How pressing then the need for proper medical inspection. The advantages gained thereby are so many and obvious that argument in its favor is scarcely required. The detection and treatment of physical defects such as adenoids, diseased tonsils, decayed teeth with resultant systemic infection, defective eyesight and hearing will often make bright an otherwise dull pupil. The spread of infectious and contagious diseases, including tuberculosis, is limited or prevented. The discovery of mental defects, determining the mental status of backward children, may lead to their amelioration or removal. Prevention of common skin and scalp diseases is made possible.

The adoption of proper seating arrangements is secured with the elimination of deformed spines and chests—the seat being made for the pupil rather than the pupil for the seat. The educational aspect of such medical examinations in inculcating in the child right habits of living constitutes the first step in the teaching of the nation.

From the sanitary viewpoint what is true of the school applies also to churches and public halls, and further reference thereto is unnecessary.

One of the pressing needs of the rural home is proper ventilation. How frequently are windows securely fastened down to prevent inlet of pure air. The wonder is that tuberculosis is not even more prevalent in our midst. The disposal of refuse and barnyard excreta also constitutes a source of danger, which can only be impressed by frequent repetition.

The inauguration of medical inspection in all the schools of the province is an urgent need. Complete inspection by competent medical officers may be impossible from a financial standpoint, but failing this a splendid stand can be made by the occasional visits of a nurse specially trained in such work. During her visit she could inspect each pupil, keeping a simple record of defects and communicating directly or by a card system with the parents of children requiring medical attention. Suitable health talks and directions for sanitary improvements could be made by her. Thus an inexpensive and fairly satisfactory beginning is possible, from which may be evolved something of real value to the people.

Thus imperfectly and briefly have I dwelt on some of the needs of rural sanitation with the hope that they may be further spread by clergy and teachers—the moulders of opinion and action in our country communities.
