Canadiens And Red Wings Battle To Scoreless Draw; Rangers Defeat Chihawks

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 28.—Detroit's Red Wings and Montreal Canadiens battled to a scoreless overtime tie in a National Hockey League match before 8,000 fans here tonight.

The tie did not help Detroit materially but it gave the red shirted Canadians undisputed position of second place, behind the fast-traveling Toronto Maple Leafs, in the Canadian section.

The work of Wilf Cude, former Detroit goalie, in the Montreal cage, was a feature of the largely defensive game. Cude kicked out 28 shots, a majority of them hard drives, while Norm Smith in the Wings' nets had 22 stops, many of which, however, were long, easy drives from the blue line.

Nine penalties were handed out, five going against Montreal.

It was Detroit's fourth drawn game in six games and left Jack Adams crew in third place of the United States section standing, behind Chicago and New York Rangers. Canadiens had not previously divided points this year.

The Montrealers, facing a heavy weekend with a game at Toronto Saturday and at Chicago on Sunday, appeared willing to accept a draw in the overtime period after their flashing attacks earlier had failed to produce a goal. Their de-

Soccer Teams Begin Cup Drive Saturday

LONDON, Nov. 28.—(C. P. Cable)—The door to fame and the English Cup will be opened Saturday to 41 soccer teams representing the third division of the Football League and 27 minor league clubs who have survived play in the preliminary rounds of the competition.

Although first and second division teams do not enter the fray until the third round is played on Jan. 11, interest is diverted for a time from the League warfare as the "little fellows," both amateurs and professional, battle for honors.

The amateur teams have nothing to lose and everything to gain and they go into the competition against stronger teams with a "do or die" spirit though they seldom progress any further than the second round.

Stockport County, Millwell and Luton Town, third division squads, were the lucky clubs to be granted exemption until the third round.

Several prominent third division sides are meeting each other and the outcome of the encounters affords ground for much speculation. Bristol City and Crystal Palace who meet at Ashton Gate have both gained reputations as giant-killers. Last season the City defeated Bury and Portsmouth and forced Preston North End into a replay before going out in the fifth round. Crystal Palace has a Cup victory over Everton at Liverpool to its credit. It is the first time the pair have met in the Cup, however, and the Palace will have to fight hard to win before a West County crowd.

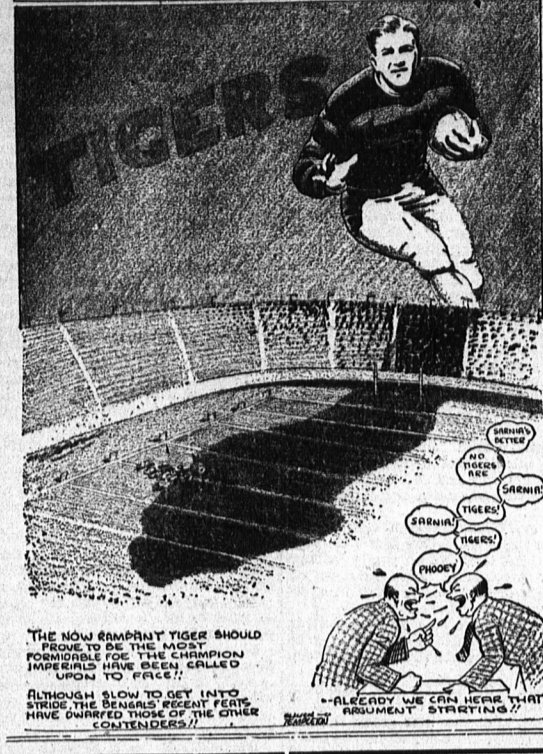
Exeter City is improving rapidly after a poor start and may be expected to beat Gillingham, although the latter has the strongest team in years. Northampton Town entertain Bristol Rovers and may come out on top.

Three draws bring clubs together that met in the first round last year. Dulwich Hamlet are at home to Torquay United, Burton goes to York while the powerful Coventry City team is host to Scunthorpe. Torquay, York and Coventry are expected to repeat last year's victories.

The famous Corinthians are the least lucky of the amateur clubs. So far this season their showing has not been convincing while Reading, leader of the Southern Section, third division, has been invincible on its own ground.

Tonight is "Youth Night" at the Forum and on display will be four smart teams that despite their youthfulness are quite capable of bringing hockey fans to their feet with exhibitions of hockey cunning that would do credit to much older players. The Canadiens-Maple Leafs midweek struggle promises to be a close battle throughout. All last season these two same teams were bitter rivals and tonight the same rivalry will be resumed. When the Rangers face off against the Royals in the junior game they will be facing a task that many think is far beyond them but the former Midgets, will be out in full force tonight to show doubtful fans that they are ready to make the jump into junior ranks. They may not be returned victors but judging by their performances in practice sessions they should give the Royals many anxious moments.

Almost all the details in connection with this season's City Hockey League were decided upon at last night's meeting in the Holy Name Club and of those yet to be threshed out only one promises any difficulty and that is affiliation. Last season all the squads played as registered clubs but this year, only two of the teams are in favor of continuing on the same basis. Cost of affiliating is the reason for the other five teams' stand on the matter, they feeling that the results obtained are not equal to the cost. Both groups are standing firm and lively discussions are to be expected before the matter is straightened out. The League however gets underway Wednesday night next with the champion Holmans squad meeting a much-strengthened Bankers' team.

Nothing new developed in the hockey situation yesterday. The Abbie dressing room, cleaned out of players' paraphernalia, presented a deserted appearance for the first time in many years and told more plainly than words that senior hockey for this season is a thing of the past. Probably ten of the players will take their departure and a definite statement as to their future destination will likely be had in a few days.

Johnny Kelley Wins Yonkers Marathon

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Johnny Kelley of Arlington, Mass., winner of the 1935 Boston Marathon, added the Yonkers marathon title to his laurels here today after running a stirring race over a wet, hilly course through Westchester County. Kelley led Leslie Pawson of Pawtucket, R. I., to the finish line in the Empire City race track by one-quarter of a mile.

His time for the full marathon course of the mile track was 2:38:43. Pawson was clocked in 2:40:16.

Mel Porter of the New York German-American A. C., took third in 2:40:22 after Pawson beat him in a spirited duel for second place. Porter, however, led the German-Americans to a team victory with 22 points.

The Monarch A. C. of Toronto was second with 28 and the Stoneyway Democratic Club of Baltimore finished third, with 30.

Dick Wilding of Mount Denis, Ont., Canada's marathon champion took sixth, with a number of other distancemen from Toronto and district close behind him.

Vic Callard, Toronto, was eighth and Alex Burnside, also Toronto, ninth. Ab Roberts of Mount Denis pulled into 14th place while Toronto's grand old man of the road grinds, 50 year old Percy Wyer, was 16th. Fred Briston of Mount Denis was on his heels, with Duncan McCallum, Toronto, 19th; Jimmy Shaw Toronto, 25th and Fred Mowbray, Toronto, 32nd.

Rankine Registers Third Straight Victory In Berwick Marathon In Record Time

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BERWICK, Pa., Nov. 28.—Robert Rankine, Preston, Ont., shoe cutter, became a three-time winner of Berwick's Thanksgiving marathon today, by legging over the rugged Briar Creek course of nine miles, 285 yards, in the record time of 47 minutes, 35 seconds.

It was a great day for Canada. Four of Rankine's countrymen finished among the first 10. They composed the full entry from the Dominion.

Eino Pentti, the Finn, who was eight seconds behind Rankine, also shattered the old course record of 47 minutes, 56 2-5 seconds set by Willie Ritola in 1922.

Informed that he beat Ritola's record, Rankine let out a whoop, then confided that he will enter a hospital next week for a hernia operation.

John Yeaman of Galt, Ont., was third. Joseph Mundy, formerly of Philadelphia, running under Milwaukee A. C. colors of New York, was fourth. Prizes for the first four went diamond rings.

Rankine's three victories were consecutive. Not since 1917, when Hannes Kolehmainen registered his third consecutive triumph, has there been a three-time winner. Lew Tewanima, Carlisle Indian, also won three times in the early years of the marathon.
