

Two huge transport ferries, part of an order for 71 for the British Admiralty, will be launched in impressive ceremonies to be held at two Montreal shipyards Saturday, August 11. Sponsoring the two ferries will be Carmen and Patricia MacDonnell (top) of Montreal, recently released from a top prison camp in the Philippines. One of the 71 ferries is pictured below as she sailed for the South Pacific theatre. 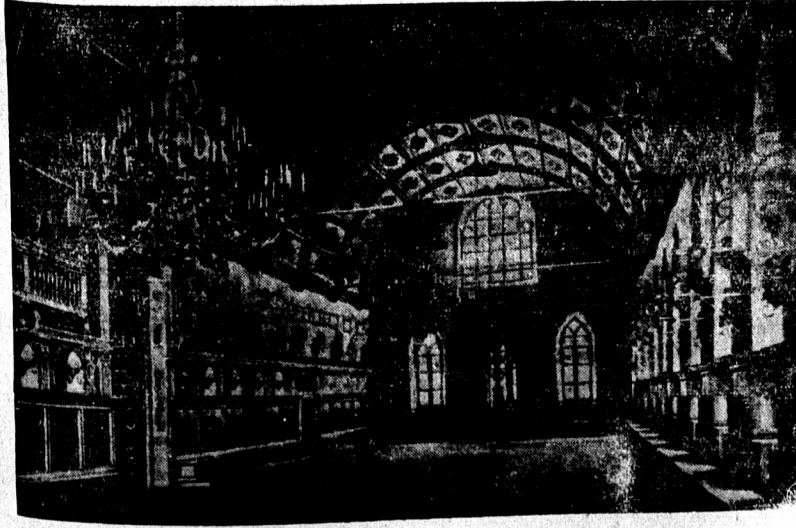
